Communication from the Board of Health to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Wilmington, N. C.: The Board of Health of New Haver county are an organized body auxiliary to the Board of Health of the State of North Carolina, which by law is constituted "The Advisors of the State in all Sanitary Matters," respectfully beg leave to call your attention to the possible danger of the introduction of yellow fever into this city unless measures are maintained for preventing it.

In the opinion of this Board the existence of this dire disease in our midst is impossible unless coming from abroad, and the fearful mortality it entails and the violent injury, if not total destruction, which it inflicts upon every mercantile and industrial pursuit, justify any regulations, however rigid and severe, deemed essential to its exclusion.
