

CAROLINA.

The Fair Grounds at Charlotte are to be sold. The apple brandy crop will be large this year. Rev. R. A. Miller will next Sunday be installed Pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Monroe.

The Governor has appointed Maj. W. J. Barker a commissioner of affidavits for North Carolina, resident in Norfolk, Va.

A competitive examination was held in Goldsboro on Thursday for the cadetship for the second district. No result announced as yet.

Raleigh News: A few days ago, the firm of W. T. Blackwell & Co. made a single shipment of one thousand cases (20,000 lbs.) of their celebrated Genuine Durham Smoking Tobacco.

The Newbern Nut Sill tells of the shooting of Mr. Steward Dixon, of Pamlico county, at his own door step by negroes who were robbing his smoke house. Two men have been arrested on suspicion and it is thought that Mr. Dixon cannot possibly recover.

Charlotte Observer: Messrs. R. H. & J. W. Garrett, of King's Mountain, write us that they have a field of corn of twenty-five acres, and that each stalk has on it from two to ten ears. They also say that from seven and three-fourth bushels of wheat sown, they reaped one hundred and seventy bushels, being about twenty-two bushels from one.

Concord Sun: Mr. Julius McAnulty, of No. 10 Township, has begun weaving operations by water power. He has two looms, which spin out several hundred yards of cloth per day. He attached the looms to some of his milling machinery and after a few failures at weaving, like the little ant and the grain of corn, his efforts were at length crowned with success. This is a good enterprise for Cabarrus.

Raleigh Observer: A deputation of Raleigh bankers waited on Treasurer Worth yesterday to ascertain the manner in which the State and county taxes imposed by the Revenue act on banks, bank stock and capital, &c., was to be paid.

After investigating the law and consulting with the Attorney-General, the Treasurer decided that the State tax was to be paid direct to the Public Treasurer and the county tax to the sheriff or tax-collector of the county. This applies to every bank in the State.

Newbern Nut Shell: The contract for erecting a cotton factory in this city has been awarded to Mr. E. M. Pavia, and that gentlemen will at once commence the erection of a factory building two stories high, and 102 feet in length by 52 feet in width, on the old cotton factory wharf near Union Point. Geo. Allen, Esq., left our city a few days since for the North, with the view of procuring the necessary machinery for the factory, which we learn it is the intention of the company to have in operation by the time new cotton commences to come in.

Concord Sun: A discovery of a revolting nature was made yesterday by a party of section hands engaged at work near the depot. The trunk of an unknown man in a horribly mangled and offensive condition was found lying at the foot of the railroad bridge. The news spread rapidly, and in a short time a large crowd of persons collected from the vicinity and a messenger was despatched for the coroner. An examination of the remains showed no identifying marks, but a package of circulars found in a pocket gave rise to the supposition that it was probably the sample trunk of a guano drummer which had accidentally fallen out of the baggage car of a passing train.

Charlotte Observer: Mr. N. Plumadore, of Raleigh, who has been in Transylvania and Henderson with the pioneers of the Catholic colony which has purchased lands in those counties, was in the city last evening. He reports that those who have come in advance to make arrangements for the colony are only waiting to have the boundaries defined and the titles to the lands which they have purchased registered properly, when they will proceed to survey the land and divide it off into farms, as well as lay off roads and take such other steps as may be necessary to enable the emigrants to go to work immediately upon their arrival. Thirty thousand acres of land have already been purchased, but it is apprehended that the number of settlers will be so augmented from what was first supposed, that more than this will be required; hence the agents, now in the mountains, authorized so to do by the Catholic Emigration Society of Philadelphia, are negotiating for an increase of territory and will doubtless succeed in their negotiations.
