An excursion from Morehead city to Hickory is on the boards. The Observer estimates that 5,000 melons are sold every day in Raleigh.

The Newbern Nut-Shell tells of two men who ate in that city, at one sitting, 30 large biscuits, two plates of meat, 10 cups of coffee, and the ectetras.

Statesville Landmark: The unusually large crop of apples and peaches is proving very disastrous to the trees. Large numbers are totally ruined and broken down by the abundant yield.

Statesville Landmark: Mr. James P. Hampton, of Jonesville, Yadkin county, was in town last week and informed us that the report of three men being killed by revenue officials in Wilkes county, was totally unfounded.

Statesville Landmark: Prof. J. H. Hill, of the Statesville Male Academy, was married to Miss Grace J. Martin, late of the Simonton Female College, and daughter of the late John B. Martin, of Richmond, Va., on last Monday.

Weldon News: The committee appointed to select the time for holding the next Fair of the Roanoke and Tar River Agricultural Association, consisting of Messrs. L. M. Long, T. L. Emry, and R. W. Brown, have chosen the 23rd, 24th, 25th, and 26th, days of October for the purpose.

Raleigh Observer: During the severe rain storm of yesterday evening Mrs. S. A. Ashe, in putting down a window sash, caught her hand in one of the panes of glass and had it severely cut. Dr. E. Burke Haywood was called in at once and dressed the wounds, which we are pleased to say are not serious though quite painful.

Statesville Landmark: A Watauga correspondent of the Lenoir Topic reports a peculiar case of insanity. A gentleman by the name of Washington Thomson has actually survived thirty-eight days, without eating a morsel of food of any kind—only drinking water. One or more prominent physicians have been with him all the time—being much interested in his case. It is stated that he says he will commence eating again as soon as his fast of forty days is at an end.

Raleigh News: During the period between June 27th and August 11th, of the present year, there were shipped by express over the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad, 21,728 boxes of peaches, and by common freight, for the same time, about 1,000 boxes. The fare per express was \$1.25 per box, and that by common freight, 84 cents. Thus it will be seen that the exportation of the one item of peaches is a source of great revenue to the State and also to the railroads.

Raleigh Observer: A woman named Emily Horne, somewhat demented and recently discharged from the N. Y. State Insane Asylum, came to Durham on Tuesday, having walked to that place from Cary, as she said. She complained of being sick and went to a bar room where she drank in rapid succession seven glasses of whiskey, from the effects of which she died about 4 o'clock p. m. of the same day. A jury of inquest was summoned who returned a verdict "that the deceased came to her death by strangling, superinduced by intoxication and probably convulsions of epilepsy."

Charlotte Observer: A telegraph repairer by the name of Boyd was killed by lightning Monday on the Air-Line Railroad. He had climbed to the top of a telegraph post while the storm was progressing, for the purpose of joining a broken wire. While in the act of clenching the wire he suddenly fell dead to the ground. As the storm had passed over the spot where he was killed, the presumption is that the lightning must have struck the wire some distance off, and was communicated from it to his body through the instrument or tool with which he was clenching it.

Many of these coins are perfect. Some of them are very scarce. A Scotch dollar of the same date as the one in his possession, at a recent sale of rarities in London, sold for one hundred and five dollars.
