CONGRESSIONAL PROCEEDINGS.

WASHINGTON D. C. Oct. 16. SENATE.—A resolution continuing the committees of the last session until further orders, was adopted.

Mr. Beck introduced a bill to repeal the act of July 2, 1862, and such sections of the revised statutes as perpetuate the oath therein prescribed. Referred to the committee on the Judiciary.

Mr. Bailey, of Tennessee, presented a petition of the Southern Methodist Publishing House, of Nashville, for indemnity for the use and consumption of its property in 1864-'65. Referred to the committee on Claims.

The Senate was full, except Morton and Sharon, and the excluded Senators from Louisiana and South Carolina.

House.—The question as to the swearing in of the two South Carolina members, Rainey and Cain, occupied the attention of the House nearly three hours.

Mr. Cox of New York, Mr. Bright of Tennessee, and other Democrats, arguing that the question should be referred to the committee on Elections, as in the Kentucky cases some years ago; and Mills of Texas, and Peter of New York, (with Banks and Butler of Massachusetts, and Hale of Maine), arguing that inasmuch as Rainey and Cain presented a prima facie case, they were entitled to be sworn in and then to have the question of the validity of their rights referred to a committee.

The House took the latter view, by a vote of 181 to 88, and Rainey and Cain were accordingly sworn in.

Objection was withdrawn in the case of Darrell of Louisiana, and he was sworn in. The case of Elam of Louisiana, was discussed, but no result reached.

The President's message was read and referred to the committee of the Whole.

THE WAR IN THE EAST.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Advices, both from Russian and Turkish sources, indicate that the Russians have occupied the Yagni Hills, Sarbaton, and Kizil-Tepe, which were abandoned by Mukhtar Pasha, and are manœuvring for an advantageous position from which to make a new attack on the Turkish lines, which are now concentrated about Aladia Dagh.

The Times has a special from the Russian headquarters at Gorney-Studen, which says the Imperial guard have all gone to Plevna, and that the Czaritch will not command them, to avoid clashing with the Prince of Roumania.

A Reuter telegram from Constantinople, dated at 10:30 o'clock this morning, says telegraphic communication with Plevna has been re-established.

Orchanie Pasha telegraphed on Sunday that he had arrived at Lukovitza from Plevna, and would continue his march to Orchanie on Monday.

VARNA, Oct. 15.—The Captain of a steamer which has arrived at Varna reports that the Russian floating batteries at the mouth of the Danube have been bombarding Sulina for three days.

The Times' special from Therapia says that the Porte has received intelligence that the Russians attacked Sulina and destroyed part of the town, but were beaten off.

The Daily News' Vienna correspondent says trustworthy advices from St. Petersburg state that 36 reserve battalions of Guards and 103 battalions of troops of the line are being formed.

The Trouble in El Paso.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Lieut. Buckner telegraphs from San Elizario to General Sheridan on the 9th inst.: "I arrived here with a detachment last evening, when the mob dispersed. To-day everything is quiet. Have had two meetings with the members of the mob. They will allow the law to take its course."

The Cost of the Famine in India.

LONDON, Oct. 16.—A special despatch from Calcutta to the Times says it is estimated that the famine will cost the Indian Government £15,000,000, exclusive of the loss of revenue and other indirect effects.

CAROLINA.

Reidsville Times: The wall of the Methodist church was completed yesterday. The job is pronounced by competent men to be first-class. The frame work is also up. The house is now ready for being covered.

Southern Home: Over one hundred have made a profession of religion at the Calvary Mission Chapel in this city, and about 50 have joined the church. This list embraces many who have heretofore led the most abandoned lives.

Southern Home: Mr. T. T. Youngblood of Steele Creek Township, presented us with the largest and finest pear that we have ever seen grown in this State or in California. It weighed exactly one pound and five ounces and had a delightful flavor.

Charlotte Observer: There were in all about 140 men on the train, divided among the companies, as follows: Mecklenburg Riflemen, 49; Polk Rifles, 23; Charlotte Greys, 35; Hornets' Nest Riflemen, 23. The companies are all equipped for the regular encampment, and left in full dress uniform.

Southern Home: The yield of the year will be on an average of about 175 to 200 pounds of lint cotton to the acre. As compared with last year the yield is considered by a few to be about the same or perhaps a little better, while the majority of replies report a decrease in the yield of from 25 to 40 per cent.

Southern Home: Mr. J. N. D. Wilson of Cabarrus county, reports the cotton crop as very light in his section. He runs a mill and cotton gin on McKee's Creek, and states that he has only ginned about a dozen or so bales of cotton thus far, whereas up to this time last year he had ginned over one hundred.

Newbern Nut Shell: The large and commodious residence of J. G. Cox, in Kingston, caught fire about 9 o'clock Friday night, from a defective fire in one of the chimneys, and was totally consumed. The house was occupied at the time by the owner and was also used for Prof. Milyett's Seminary. The property is said to be fully insured.

Charlotte Observer: Two or three ladies who had attended Calvary Mission church and observed that it was in need of a communion service, interested themselves last week to the extent of canvassing the city and raising a considerable sum of money, with which they purchased a neat cut-glass service for use on occasions. The gift was a highly acceptable one, and was much appreciated by the pastor as well as by the congregation in general.

Newbern Nut Shell: Mr. Oliver S. Dewey, a highly respected citizen of this place, was stricken with apoplexy on one of our streets yesterday. A friend being with him at the time, assistance was immediately procured and Mr. Dewey removed to his residence, where, after the lapse of about two hours, during which time a copious amount of blood was drawn from him, ice applied to his forehead, mustard plasters used on his body and other medical treatment administered by two eminent physicians, he opened his eyes in consciousness, with all his faculties restored, to the delight of his many friends who were standing around his bedside. During Mr. Dewey's short illness, much excitement was manifested on our streets and much anxiety suffered by his relatives, as it was feared the attack would prove fatal.
