France's Political Crisis.
PARIS, Nov. 2.—Victor Hugo, the *Happel*, says: "Many Republican senators and Deputies have arrived. Although no formal meetings have yet been held, there have been frequent conversations between them. From these conversations deductions may be made concerning the intentions of the Republicans, and the course of events may, to a certain extent, be predicted. There have been negotiations or overtures for a compromise with the men of the 16th of May. No member of the Left has been approached with this object by any representative, more or less direct, of the *Elysée*. The Vermont Railroad War.
NORTH TROY, Vt., Nov. 2.—The excitement prevails in the province, since the death of Col. Foster. The Canadian militia has been called out, and the entire line of the Southern Railroad in Canada is closely guarded. Trains are run on the road from North Troy to East Richford, guarded by a strong detachment of red coats, to prevent any stopping or seizure of trains. No one is allowed to cross the Canadian line in the night at this place without being closely examined. A strong force of Canadian soldiers is guarding the depot at Mansfield, and a fight may occur at any time.

The Fighting in Bulgaria.
LONDON, Nov. 2.—A special despatch from Bogot, about eight miles south of Plevna, to the *Times*, says: "The *Centennial* arrived here on the 27th of October. The Grand Duke Nicholas has his headquarters here. Gen. Todleben is at Tachanitz with his staff. The Prince of Roumania's headquarters are at Peradin. An attack on Teliacheva simultaneously with the capture of Dubnik on the 24th ultimo was repulsed with the loss of 1,000 men. The loss at Dubnik was 3,000. Every brigade and regimental commander was killed or wounded. As nearly all the officers of the grand army were personally known at headquarters, it is not that 200 officers have been killed, but that the members of the staff at the bombardment of Plevna continue in a desolatory way."

Our Trade With England.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—While the export trade of England to the United States is rapidly declining, the import trade from the United States is increasing year after year, and these imports are goods which she must have, while her exports are goods not actually necessary to us. During the year 1867 England imported from the United States \$84,769,000 and exported thereto \$122,000,000, a balance of trade in favor of England of over \$37,000,000. During the year 1870 she imported from this country goods to the value of \$367,352,000, while her exports either amounted to only \$260,000,000 (\$24,000,000 less than in 1870) showing a balance of trade in favor of the United States of over \$265,000,000.

CAROLINA.

Revenue collections last week in the Raleigh district, \$30,655.22.

Raleigh News: We know a young miss of Raleigh named Ida Myrtle (she has another name) who was nine years old on Friday, and weighs one hundred pounds and four ounces, and she is still growing. She is well proportioned and is very pretty besides.

Raleigh News: The shipment of cotton over the North Carolina Railroad from this city and other points along the line for the Northern markets is enormous. It is estimated by this route has increased since the opening of this line tenfold over any previous year. The R. & C. Railroad Co. is doing a prosperous business in freights.

Wilmington News: Work on the Chester and New York Railroad, between Wilmington and Newton, is progressing rapidly. The work is now under the supervision of Mr. J. E. Fry, of this county, a man of much experience in handling roads. There are now about 1,000 men employed on the road, and it is estimated that the force a few days ago was 1,200.

Wilmington News: A band-car in charge of Capt. J. J. Roberson, who was accompanied by W. H. Marshall, Esq., was crossing the railroad bridge over the Trent, and a negro woman on the track, and every effort was made to stop the car. The woman, who was carrying on one of the side-boards a bundle of goods, attempted to jump from the car, and upon her arrival on the shore, fell on her head, and the band-car passed over her, precipitating its engine down the railroad embankment. Captain Roberson was severely bruised, but not dangerously hurt; but we regret to state that Mr. Marshall and the woman were seriously injured.

Ex-Treasurer Cardoza's Trial.
COLUMBUS, S. C., Nov. 1.—The trial of ex-State Treasurer Cardoza was begun today by Judge Speaker Lee testified that there was a surplus of \$4,000 of the appropriation for the legislative session of 1870.
