What is it?
 A short distance below the city a terri-
 ble odor arises from the eastern bank o
 the river. Fishermen have been of the
 opinion that the odor came from the
 bodies of the burnt horses, but as they
 were not thrown in the river the sup-
 position of Coroner Hewlett is that the
 body of the colored man who was drown-
 ed over a week ago had been washed
 ashore at that point. An investigation
 will be made to-morrow.

Mortuary.
 The Mortuary statistics of this city
 will compare favorably with any city of
 its size in the country. During the year
 just closed there were only ninety-six
 interments in Oakdale Cemetery, fifteen
 of which were brought here for burial.
 In Bellevue Cemetery there were only
 twenty-six interments, eleven adults and
 fifteen children. In Pine Forest Cemetery
 (colored), there were two hundred and
 thirty-four interments of which one hun-
 dred and thirty-nine were children under
 twelve years of age. The total death roll
 of the city for the past year foots up only
 three hundred and forty one, and it must
 be remembered that of this number a
 great many still born infants are included.

For the Reception of Gen. Colston.
 Some of the former pupils of Gen. R. E.
 Colston assembled at the Armory of the
 Wilmington Light Infantry last evening
 to make preparation for the reception of
 Gen. Colston upon his return among us
 after an absence of almost a decade. Mr.
 Geo D Parsley, senior officer of the old
 corps was called to the chair. After de-
 bate as to the best method of receiving
 Gen. Colston, a committee, consisting of
 Messrs Geo D Parsley, Jno D Bellamy,
 W B McKay, J M Cronly and C B
 Wright, were appointed to ascertain when
 Gen. Colston would return, and to report
 as to arrangements, etc; at a meeting to
 be held to-morrow evening—due notice of
 which will be given through the daily
 papers.

A Good Time.
 The pupils connected with the Brook-
 lyn Mission Sunday School were regaled
 with a bountiful supper on Tuesday eve-
 ning, prepared for them by their officers
 and teachers, and spread at their school-
 room in Brooklyn Hall. It was an hour
 when the young folks were licensed to
 "eat, drink and be merry," and they
 availed themselves of the opportunity to
 their content, and all, for the time, were
 as happy as the young should be. Love
 for officers and teachers has made this
 Sunday School one of the most flourishing
 in the city, and the festivities of last
 night, by strengthening the bonds of af-
 fection between teachers and pupils, will
 add to its usefulness and prosperity.

Many Facts in Small Compass.
 The number of languages spoken is 2,
 065. The number of men is equal to the
 number of women. The average human
 life is about 33 years; one-quarter die be-
 fore the age of 7. To every 1,000 persons
 one rarely reaches the age of 100 years
 and not more than one in 500 will reach
 the age of 80. There are on earth 1,000,
 000,000 inhabitants. Of these 33,333,333
 die every year, 81,824 die every day, 3,789
 every hour and 60 every minute. The
 losses are balanced by an equal number of
 births. The married are longer lived than
 the single ones. Tall men live longer than
 short ones. Women have more chances of
 life previous to the age of fifty years, but
 fewer after, than men. The number of
 marriages is in proportion as 70 to 100.
 Marriages are more frequent after the
 equinoxes, that is, during the months of
 June and December. Those born in the
 spring are more robust than others. Births
 and deaths are more frequent by night
 than by day.

 who had been made drunk, and that of a
 colored sailor who was committed to the
 cell, for disorderly conduct, for twenty
 days. The boy was discharged.

New Year's Callers.
 There were some New Year's callers in

 generally observed in this way. This
 custom which was only inaugurated here
 after the war, has been gradually dying
 out each succeeding year until finally there
 are but very few, indeed, who keep up
 the practice.
