## Probable Homicide.

A friend at Burgaw sends us the particulars of a shooting affair which occurred on the plantation of B. W. Moore, Esq., in Columbia township, Pender county, on last Thursday night. About 7 o'clock on the night in question one Henry Moore, a colored boy about 16 years old, shot a colored girl of about the same age, whom he met at the house of one Frank Herring, colored, on Mr. R. W. Moore's premises. Frank and Eliza were skylarking together when the girl slapped him on the cheek, whereupon he went to the further part of the cabin, put on his coat and drew a pistol from one of its pockets. He then returned to the fireplace and after telling the girl, three times in succession, that he intended to shoot her, he fired the pistol, the ball striking the girl near the eye and passing through her head, lodging under the skin on the back of the neck from whence it was afterwards extracted. The intending murderer was arrested and carried before Justice G. F. Walker by whom he was ordered to give a justified bond of \$200 for his appearance at next term of Superior Court for Pender county, or in default thereof, to be committed to jail. At last accounts the wounded girl's situation was so critical that but few hopes of her recovery were entertained.

## The Colored Troops.

At a meeting of the Cape Fear Light Infantry, Co. B, 5th Battalion (colored) N. C. State Guard, held last evening by order of Brig. Gen. M. P. Taylor, commanding Second Military Division, for the purpose of electing a Captain, vice Sol. W. Nash, W. H. Howe, Jr., was elected to fill the vacancy.  
At a similar meeting of the New Hanover Light Infantry, Co. A, Alex. Sampson was elected Captain vice A. B. Lind.

## Burned.

This morning a colored woman, in the employ of a gentleman living on Chestnut street, while standing with her back to the fire, had her clothing ignited, and before the flames could be extinguished she was severely burned. A physician was called, who applied the necessary remedies, and at last accounts the patient was resting easily.

The old eye sores at the corner of Market and Second streets are being repaired.

## County Commissioners.

The Board met yesterday afternoon: Committee on poor house and public buildings reported progress.

The Chairman appointed Commissioners Worth and Bagg to audit and settle the accounts of the Sheriff with the county Treasurer.

Edward Schriever having been appointed a constable of Cape Fear township at the previous meeting of the Board, tendered his official bond for \$500, which was accepted.

Thomas Harrell declined the appointment of overseer of the public road, second division, from Desert branch to Sturgeon Creek.

Petition of A. Carr, for hands, in connection with the Gordon road, was referred to Commissioner J. A. Montgomery, with power to act.

Applications from the following persons for licenses to retail liquor in the city were granted: John D. Dosher and R. J. Scarborough.

D. C. Davis tendered his resignation as a member of the school committee of Harnett township. On motion the same was accepted, and Mr. W. B. Giles appointed.

The election of Standard Keeper for the county coming up, Messrs. N. Morris and J. C. Millis were voted for, the former receiving three and the latter two votes. Mr. Morris was then declared duly elected.

The bids of Nora Sampson, Jas. A. Lowery, Duncan Holmes, Thomas Rivera, Robert Sweat, and James H. Bryant, for furnishing coffins and burying the dead of the county, were opened and the contract awarded to Nora Sampson as the lowest bidder.

The contract for keeping the county poor and insane was awarded to Mr. John F. Garrell, as also for keeping the prisoners at the Work House. He gave a bond in the first instance of \$1,000 and in the second of \$500.

Ordered that the prisoners at the Work House be turned over to Mr. Garrell on the 7th inst.  
Dr. W. W. Lane was ordered to be continued as County Physician under the present contract.

The following was adopted:  
WHEREAS, At the last meeting of this Board, it was ordered that the clerk of the Board should request His Honor, Judge McKoy, not to hold a term of the Superior Court in the month of January, 1879, the Board having been advised that the said term was not in conformity to law; and whereas, the Board is at the present time advised that there is doubt in regard to the legality of holding his court, some members of the legal profession being of one opinion and some being of the contrary opinion, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board intended by their action no disrespect to His Honor, Judge McKoy, in making the request aforesaid, but only to express their desire to save expense to the county.

Ordered, that it be referred to the Attorney of the Board to examine into the claim presented by H. Nutt, as an offset to the judgment rendered against him by the county as surety upon the bond of J. C. Mann, and report to the Board if the same be just, and also if the said Mann is indebted to the county in any other amount than is included in said judgment; and he be authorized to induce the execution now in the Sheriff's hands, until after the next meeting of the Board.

The Board proceeded to destroy two bonds, Nos. 50 and 100; each for \$100, with last coupon attached to each; 13 coupons, \$3 each, and two gold coupons, \$15 each.

The County Treasurer's report for the month of December was received and ordered to be referred to the Finance Committee.

Ordered that the Finance Committee meet on Monday evening, the 13th inst., at 7 o'clock.  
Adjourned, to meet next Wednesday, the 15th inst.

## Home Made Ice.

## Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular session at the City Hall, last night.

Committee on Fire Department reported, in the matter of a fire alarm, that the alarm be put on the City Hall, as soon as funds can be obtained.

Petition of J. H. McGarity & Co., to erect a wooden shed, was not granted.

Committee on Lights were granted further time in the matter of the petition of T. J. Southerland for a lamp.

A petition from butchers was, on motion, laid 'op the table.

The committee on Overcoats made a report of what had been done by them in the purchase of overcoats, and also recommended that the two janitors be furnished with overcoats and hats.

Alderman Flanner moved that the report and recommendation be received and adopted, and the coats and hats furnished janitors be charged to Public Buildings. Adopted.

A communication from Dr. Wood, in answer to a resolution passed at the last meeting, was read, and, on motion of Alderman Flanner, the Mayor was requested to call a special meeting as soon as Dr. Wood was ready to make a report.

Application from O. G. Parsley, Jr., to erect a one story wooden building, with tin roof, for an office, corner Water and Orange streets, was recommended by the committee on Fire Department and granted by the Board.

Application from Wm. Marsteller was referred to Committee on Market and Fees.

Alderman Flanner moved that the resolutions adopted by the citizens' meeting in relation to the debt of the city and the issuing of bonds in settlement of the same, be adopted by the Board.

Alderman Foster moved to amend by inserting in any bonds issued, "that the same shall be taxed, the same to be listed by the Clerk and Treasurer."

The amendment was lost, and the original motion adopted.

On motion of Alderman Flanner, a committee of two from the Board of Aldermen was appointed to cooperate with the citizens' committee to memorialize the Legislature about the issuance of bonds.

The Mayor appointed Aldermen Flanner and Foster as the committee.

Alderman Flanner also moved that the same committee make application to have the city charter amended so as to empower the Board of Aldermen to levy a tax on all milk wagons, carts and drays used in the city, and vegetable and produce dealers doing business outside of the Market House. Carried.

Alderman Lowrey moved that W. P. Canaday, Esq., be notified to fill up and arrange his street railroad on a level with the street on Fourth street, between Hilton and Market street, within ten days, failing in which the Chief of Police is instructed to fill up the same at Mr. Canaday's expense.

Adjourned.
