

THE OHIO GOVERNORSHIP.  
Senator Thurman Declares that he Will Not be a Candidate.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—Senator Thurman will not determine until to-morrow whether he will attend the Democratic celebration at Columbus, Ohio, on the 8th inst. He will do so if the weather moderates so as to render travelling less disagreeable than now, and in such case he will start for that city to-morrow night. The theme assigned to him for a speech is "The Jackson Democracy," and to this subject he says he would devote his remarks, without discussing the financial question. He would also give the reasons why he does not desire his name to be used as a candidate for the Governorship of Ohio, as has been predicted for him. The Senator is free and emphatic in the declaration that, under no possible circumstances, will he allow his name to be thus used, and of this determination he has advised numerous prominent Democrats in Ohio who have written to, or orally communicated with him upon the subject.

THE FRENCH ELECTIONS.  
Great Republican Triumph—About Fifty-Seven Majority in the Senate.

PARIS, Jan. 5.—The Senatorial elections, which took place to-day, resulted in a great Republican triumph. Of 47 Conservative Senators, whose terms expired, only 13 have been re-elected. All the retiring Republican Senators have been re-elected. The general result shows the election of 15 Conservative and 64 Republican. The Republican majority in the Senate will be about 57. Second ballots are necessary in the Departments of Haute-Garonne and Landes. The result of the election in Martinique is not yet known.

Among the newly elected Republican Senators are M. M. Fourmier, Ambassador to Turkey; De Ramsat, Faye Massy, and Gen. Fournier. Among the rejected Conservatives are MM. de Belcastel, Lucey, Dhuic, Dufaur de Gavardie, Adrien de Montgolfier, Vicomte de Meux, M. Depuyre, M. de Bastard D'aru, Gen. Boissonnet, M. Bernard-Durrel, M. Bompard, Comte de Bouville, Marsel Carobert, and Gons. Poncelet, Lavey, and de Espeuilles.

Later returns show that M. Dufaur de Gavardie, Conservative, has been elected to the Senate on a second ballot.

Elector statistics wonderfully corroborate the reports of the progress made by the Republican party in France. Fifty-six Conservatives elected in 1876 received 15,646 votes, whereas in 1879 they obtained 3,208 votes only, thus losing 12,438 votes. Nineteen Republicans elected in 1876 received 5,636 votes, and in 1879 received 20,262, thus gaining 14,626 votes.

THE FAILURE OF THE CORNISH BANK.  
LONDON, Jan. 5.—It is believed that the liabilities of the Cornish Bank are over a million pounds sterling. Some say the bank can pay in full, but it seems to be the more general opinion that this is impossible in the present state of mining enterprise. It is believed the mines of Western Cornwall alone owe the bank £100,000, the calling in of which loans would have a most disastrous effect on the whole of West Cornwall.

Collections to Aid Archbishop Purcell.  
CINCINNATI, Jan. 5.—Collections to aid Archbishop Purcell in his financial distress were taken in the Cathedral and other churches to-day and large sums obtained. The committee sent out to take collections throughout the diocese are actively at work, and the amount thus obtained is very large.

Suleiman Pasha Exiled for Life.  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 5.—Suleiman Pasha's appeal was rejected. He has been degraded and exiled for life, and now appeals to the Sultan for pardon. Suleiman Pasha, the new Ambassador to Paris, has asked the Sultan to be allowed to remain in Constantinople, and is authorized to postpone his departure. It is possible that another Ambassador may be appointed.

The Porte to Surrender Podgoritz.  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 5.—It is said that the Montenegrins intend to forcibly enter Podgoritz, without awaiting the arrival of the Turkish Commission at Scutari. The Porte has informed Prince Lobanoff that it has absolutely resolved to surrender Podgoritz. If the Commissioners fail to persuade the inhabitants, it will withdraw the Turkish troops and functionaries. Prince Lobanoff has replied that the surrender of Podgoritz will accelerate Russia's evacuation of Turkish territory.

The Raleigh News learns that the number of convicts at the Penitentiary on the 1st of December was 349; at work on the Western North Carolina Railroad, 592; on the Western Railroad, 99; on the Chester and Lenoir 48; and on the Georgia and North Carolina, 28, making a total of 1,116.

The Kinston Journal says: In the last Congressional election Captain Kitchen lacked only fifteen votes of receiving the Vance vote of 1876, in Jones county. Now, we hope Col. Waddell will not think we had no potatoes to dig on that day, for our neighbor, J. C. Parker, made this year at the rate of four hundred bushels to the acre, and had plenty time to vote for Kitchen. If any body doubts it we will give particulars.
