Plants in Winter.

Plants packed away in collars, that are quite dark, or nearly so, will require very little water; once a week will be sufficient, and be very careful to give but little. The gas found in the cellars of some houses will be found to injure these plants, and should be guarded against. Our experience with plants in a sleeping room is such as to lead us to say that they will not be of the least discomfort, or in any way injure the person occupying the room.

New Line—Five Offices.

A telephone line is being erected between this city and the Navassa Guano Company's works, at Meares' Bluff. The line and instruments will be owned by the Gold and Stock Telegraph Co., who control all lines and instruments. It is being erected under the supervision of Mr. L. A. Angel. There will be five offices all in connection with each other. An instrument will be placed at the Bluff, one at Hilton, one at the office of W. C. & A. R. R. Co., one at the depot of the Carolina Central Railway Company and one at the office of the Navassa Guano Company in this city. The instruments will be larger than those now in use in this city, and the line will besides be a safe guard against accidents, by collision etc., and will prove a great convenience to those interested in this erection.

Magistrate's Court.

Before Justice Hall this morning George Taylor, colored, for assault and battery upon the person of Frank Hargrave, both denizens of Paddy's Hollow, was fined the costs and sentenced to thirty days imprisonment in the County Jail.

Mr. M. S. Veney sued out a peace warrant this morning for the arrest of George Hill, colored, alias Snooks, for threatening to burn his (Veney's) house down, on the corner of Market and Thirteenth streets. Hill was arrested and had a preliminary trial before Justice Hall this morning at 11 o'clock. In the evidence it was found that the defendant had already made two attempts to carry out his threat. He was bound over to the Criminal Court in the sum of \$100 justified bond in default of which he was committed to jail.

A Pretty and Cheap Card Basket.

Procure six pieces of ground glass, four inches square, and one piece for the bottom, having six sides of four inches each to fix the six pieces to. Bind the six pieces with colored ribbon, and sew the ribbon together, edge to edge; this fixes the pieces together; and the top of each joint with a bow of ribbon. The basket may be made to flare by having the pieces cut properly. The glass may be ornamented by painting a pattern on it of copal varnish with a camel's hair brush. Or clear glass may be used, and pictures or designs attached to the sides. Ground glass is obtainable at any glazier's or glass dealer's as also stained or etched glass of beautiful designs. Handsome paper ornaments can be obtained for a few cents at any fancy store.
