Col. McRae's Lecture and the Wilmington Library Association.

The lecture to be delivered by Col, Duncan K. McRae, on Friday night, as we have previously mentioned, is for the benefit of the Library Association, of this city, an institution which has struggled long and hard, though many vicissitudes for an existence and which is in every way worthy of the noble effort that we know the distinguished orator who is te speak on Friday evening will make in its

behalf The Association was organized in the year 1855, with Dr. W. G. Thomas as president, who was succeeded by the late Dr James H Dickson, until the death of the latter named gentleman, which occurred during the terrible scourge of yellow fever in this city in the autumn of 1862. Dr. Thomas was at that time vice presi-

dent of the Association. There is no record of any meeting or election of officers after the death of the lamented Dr. Dickson until Dec. 6th, 1865, (after the war), when the members of the Association again met together for the purpose of reorganizing and reviving the Association. This meeting was held in the Commissioner's Room, at the City Hall, the rooms of the library in the same building which had been ceded to them by the city, being in possession of the Yankee military officials, who at that time had control of all the public property in the city. At this meeting Dr. W. G. Thomas was unanimously chosen again to fill the office of President.

After his second elevation to the Presidency of this institution Dr. Thomas went to work with an energy and a will worthy of the highest praise to rescue the wreck of the property of the association from those into whose hands it had fallen. Books were found here and there scattered in different bouses all over the city. Among those who ap-We were glad to receive a visit this propriated the books of the library to their own use we might mention one Rhodes, had been particularly officious in distributing the books of the library among his many acquaintances and friends, then domiciled in Wilmington. Finally through the indefatigable persistence of the President, the rooms were returned to the association and they were allowed to take quiet possession of them.

But no sooner in quiet possession of their property than a new trouble threatened them from a different source. The Radical party which had obtained control of the city government by the aid of numerous "fifteenth amendments," claimed the rooms of the Association as the property of the city and threatened to enter suit for them. The Association having no deed for the property and net having in the remotest way anticipated any such state of affairs as the result of the war had brought 'about and furthermore not having any money to contest a suit, thought it best to compromise the matter, which they did, with the Republican Mayor, Mr. Silas N. Martin, and for the consideration of \$1,500, relinquished all claim to the rooms and moved their books

Dr. Thomas served the association as President until 1872 when he declined to accept the office any longer and Col. Wm. L. Smith was elected in his stead. Col. Smith declined a reelection in November, 1875, when Mr. Norwood Giles was elected as Col. S's. successor, Mr. Giles declined a reelection in November of last year when Mr. C. E. French, the present incumbent, was chosen Presi-

The number of volumes in the library at the close of the war was between 1600 and 2,000. The number at present we understand is between 2,500 and 3,000.
