Waffles

Official Report

Of the meeting of the several Committees of Three, appointed by the several Democratic Ward Clubs of the City of Wilmington, on February 15th, 1879, to take final action in regard to instructing the City Executive Committee:

Meeting at 3 o'clock, p. m., on Saturday, February 15th, 1879. All the members of the Committee of the several wards being present, on motion of F. H. Darby, Capt. D. R. Murchison was called to the Chair, and on motion of A. T. London, F. H. Darby was requested to act as Secretary.

There were present:
First Ward—J. L. Dudley, Charles Murphy, A. B. Perse.
Second Ward—James G. Burr, Roger Moore, A. T. London.
Third Ward—H. A. Bagg, E. S. Martin, John W. Perdue.
Fourth Ward—James Reilly, Henry Brunhill, D. R. Murchison.
Fifth Ward—F. H. Darby, A. H. Leslie, W. H. Griffith.

The Chairman stated the object of the meeting, and after some discussion, the following resolutions were adopted by a large majority:
Resolved, That the City Executive Committee be instructed to procure the passage by the General Assembly, at the present session, of a bill providing for the continuance of the present Mayor and Board of Aldermen in office for another term.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution and recommendation to continue the present Board of Aldermen in office for the term of two years is upon the express understanding and condition that when any member of the Board of Aldermen shall be called upon by a majority of the Democratic voters of his Ward to resign that he shall do so.

The conference then adjourned.

Col. J. R. Davis, late of the Purcell House in Norfolk, but now of the Emory House at Weldon, is in the city to-day.

The Body of a Dead White Man Found on the County Road Six or Eight Miles from the City.

Daniel Richardson, a colored youth of some seventeen or eighteen years of age, walked into the City Hall this afternoon and reported having seen a dead white man on the road between here and Rocky Point at noon to-day. The youth was referred to the Sheriff's office and by the latter named official referred to the Coroner, before whom he made the following statement: First giving his name as above he said that he is a resident of this place and had been on a visit to his Aunt, Sarah Berry, some 12 miles from Wilmington, and was returning to this city to-day about noon, when between six and eight miles from here he discovered the body of an unknown white man lying in a ditch alongside the road with his face down. He was certain the person, whom he described as a tall man with thin face and sandy whiskers, was not asleep, but dead and had the appearance of having been dead a day or so. The dead man was tolerably well dressed, though he did not pay much attention to his clothes, being terribly frightened when he first discovered the body. Saw a white man and a colored man just ahead of him who both looked at the body and then went on. Special Coroner A. H. Leslie will empanel a jury this afternoon and proceed to the spot where the dead man is alleged to have been seen to-morrow morning at 7 o'clock, when an investigation will be held and some facts not here mentioned elicited from witnesses that may be summoned.

County Commissioners.

An adjourned meeting of the Board of County Commissioners was held in the Commissioners' room at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon. Present Col. Wm. L. Smith, Chairman and Commissioners A. J. Grady, James A. Montgomery, H. A. Bagg and B. G. Worth.

The following persons were granted license to sell Potent Liqueurs viz: W. H. M. Cook, Claus Schriver, James Keigan, Sarah J. Meyer and Jao O'Brien.

Ordered that the clerk be instructed to notify sundry citizens residing in Masonboro and Federal Point townships that their petition to have a new public road laid out in the above named townships will be acted upon at the next meeting of the Board to be held on the first Monday in March.

Ordered that Commissioner Montgomery, of Federal Point township, be authorized to contract for repairing the bridge on Masonboro road near Richard Beasley's land.

Ordered that the resignation of J. E. St. George as overseer of the public road in Cape Fear township be accepted.

The Pythian Parade.

We have been requested to state that the members of Germania Lodge who are not uniformed and desiring the same will report the fact to either of the committee, who will also furnish them with saddle blankets, or the same can be procured at the store of P. C. John Meyer, on North Water street. Rosettes will be furnished to the Knights who occupy carriages, by the Committee at the place of assemblage. P. G. C., W. H. Gerken has been appointed Marshal and he has designated P. C.'s; F. A. Schults and Jno. Meyer and V. C., Aug. Wehrhahn as assistants who will be obeyed and respected accordingly. If the weather should prove unfavorable the parade will be postponed until a future day, of which announcement will be given.
