#### For the Cape Fear.

The Senate Committee on Commerce have reported the River and Harbor Appropriation bill, with certain amendments, among which is one increasing the amount for the Cape Fear to \$75,000. This is better than the \$25,000 formerly reported, but it is not enough for the requirements, as the work of closing New Inlet is now well advanced and should be prosecuted vigorously. Still, we will be thankful for all we can get.

#### Lieutenant Pickett's Remains.

The officers of Company F, of the 31 N. C. Infantry, who are the surviving comrades of the late Isaac J. Pickett, will have his remains disinterred and removed to Oakdale Cemetery. The ladies of the Memorial Association will then, as is the custom of this Association whenever an ex-Confederate soldier dies or is buried here, have a marble slab or stone placed at the head of the grave with the initials of the deceased and those of the command to which he belonged carved upon it.

### Criminal Court.

This Court met this morning at 11 o'clock, His Honor Judge Meares presiding, pursuant to adjournment, for the purpose of listening to the argument of counsel in favor of a discharge of the prisoner in the case of Hector Davis, indicted for assault and battery with intent to commit rape, the jury having found the defendant guilty of the first charge and not guilty as to the second, on the trial of the case.

### The Telephone.

The telephone is used in large cities almost universally. Business men are patronizing it wonderfully. It is also used largely in private houses. Though separated by many miles of distance, any patron may carry on conversation with any other patron without danger of the violation of secrecy. By means of it physicians are able to dictate modes of treatment and prescriptions to patients at a distance in case of ordinary ailment. It seems likely that its use will now become universal.

### Exit February.

The last of the winter months steps down and out to-day; not meekly and mildly like an old man, worn out in the struggle of life seeking his rest, but boldly and vigorously. It has been obliged to yield to the force of circumstances, but it does so without the least particle of demoralization. Its breath to-day is as cold and biting as it was in its prime hours. People may talk and write and sing of the glories of winter, but, for ourselves, if there is to be any change of weather in the next thirty days we hope it may be somewhat warmer than it was to-day.

### Fire in Brooklyn.

Last night between 12 and 1 o'clock a blaze of fire was discovered underneath the house of Mr. Frank Maunder, just beyond the railroad bridge, on Fourth street, in Brooklyn. Fortunately, the fire was discovered in time to prevent much of a conflagration or any serious damage, except the destruction of some kindling wood which Mr. Maunder had stored under his house.

The fire was evidently the work of an incendiary, and but for the timely notice given by some one sounding the alarm who was passing along the street there is no telling what the extent of the destruction to life and property might have been, as the occupants of the house had all retired to bed.

As will be seen, the new appointees are all sterling Democrats. Their term of office continues for six years.

### This Morning's Conflagration.

Between the hours of four and five this morning, a two-story frame building, situated near the corner of Front and Church streets, was discovered to be on fire. The building had evidently been burning some time and soon it was enveloped in flames. It was occupied by Dr. I. N. Carr, and owned by Mr. W. G. Fowler. Dr. Carr's family hardly had time to escape with their lives and in fact one of the ladies had to be passed out of a window, as egress by the front and back doors was cut off by the flames.

A greater portion of the furniture of the house was destroyed by fire, as was also the family clothing. There was an insurance of \$500, in a company represented by DeRosset & Northrop, on the furniture, but Dr. Carr's loss was considerably over these figures. There was no insurance on the building. The cause of the fire is supposed to have been rats and matches. A woman occupying a house near the destroyed building notified Mr. Fowler a few days ago that an attempt was made to fire the house she lived in, and it may be that this morning's fire was the work of an incendiary. Mr. Fowler thought that in all probability the woman was frightened and paid but little heed to her. His loss is estimated at about \$1,500.

The cautionary off-shore signal was flying for a short time this morning.

#### U. S. Commissioner McQuigg's Decision.

U. S. Commissioner McQuigg rendered a decision yesterday in the case of J. W. Whitney and others, indicted by Mr. George L. Schutte for perjury, in favor of the defendants and they were discharged. We know nothing about the merits or demerits of the case in regard to the two additional parties, not having heard any of the evidence. But we did hear a portion of the evidence in the case of the first named individual—J. W. Whitney, from the mouths of several respectable witnesses, which to our mind was pretty clear and conclusive proof of his guilt. Still, we are not lawyer enough to analyze the merits of the case but we have been told that of all the crimes in the calendar the most difficult to prove against a man is perjury; that not only must the fact of the false swearing be established but a criminal motive therefor must be proved.

#### Hints to those Calling Upon the Sick.

Only call at the door unless you are sure your friend is able to see you without harm.

Enter and leave the house, and move about the room, quietly.

Carry a cheerful face, and speak cheerful words.

In order to be cheerful, you need tell no lies.

If your friend is very sick, do not fall into gay and careless talk in the attempt to be cheerful.

Don't ask questions, and thus oblige your friend to talk.

Talk about something outside, and not the disease and circumstances of the patient.

Tell the news, but not the news of the sick and dying.

If possible, carry something with you to please the eye and relieve the monotony of the sick-room; a flower, or even a picture which you can look for a few days.

If desirable, some little delicacy to tempt the appetite will be well bestowed.

The perfume of some flowers is poisonous, and they should never be carried into a sick-room. Especially is this true of the tuberose, oleander, heliotrope, hyacinth, orange, lilac, syringa and lilacs.

Stay only a moment, or a few minutes at the longest, unless you can be of some help.

### A Suggestion

We respectfully suggest to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, that at their next regular meeting they take into consideration the propriety of obtaining the services of some shrewd, sharp detective for the purpose of ferreting out, if possible, the gang of "fire boys" (as they are termed in New York) who have recently caused so much destruction to property in this city by their incendiary fires.
