Board of Aldermen.

The Board met in regular monthly ses-
sion last night.

The Finance Committee were granted
further time in the matter of Henry Tay-
lor.

The same Committee reported favor-
ably on the petition of James & Brown,
and the petition was granted, to take effect
from April 1st next.

Committee on Fire Department, having
in hand the petition of the Cape Fear Fire
Engine Company for an extension of
engine house, reported that there being
no funds in the department appropriation,
the petition be not granted.

Same Committee, in the matter of the
petition of T. J. Southerland, reported
favorably and the petition was granted.

The Sanitary Committee was granted
further time on the applications of F. M.
James and R. C. Dudley for positions as
health officers. Subsequently, the neces-
sity of a health officer appearing, and
there not being sufficient funds in the po-
lice appropriation to increase the force,
the Board instructed the Mayor to dis-
charge one policeman and appoint F. M.
James as a health officer.

The Ordinance Committee was granted
further time on the letter of George Har-
riss.

Special committee on Telephones re-
ported progress.

Petition of B. Solomon for damage
done to his stock by the Cape Fear Steam
Fire Engine Company, was referred to
the Committee on Fire Department.

Petition of Mrs. Warren, to erect a shed
corner Second and Dock streets, was re-
ferred to the same committee.

Petitions from sundry persons, for ap-
pointment on police force, were referred
to Committee on Police.

Report of Colonel Roger Moore, Chief
Engineer of Fire Department, relative to
fires occurring during the month of Feb-
ruary, was received and read and ordered
spread upon the minutes.

Bid of T. J. Southerland, to keep city
mules and furnish drivers at \$30 a month
to each mule, was accepted from termina-
tion of present contract, which contract
expires April 1, 1879.

Bid of P. Cumming & Co., to furnish
the city hard brick at \$8 and soft brick at
\$7 per thousand, was accepted.

All other bids were deferred to the next
regular meeting.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a committee of three
members of this Board be appointed by
the Chairman to draft suitable resolutions
expressive of the sentiments of the Board
relative to the loss sustained by the city
in the death of the late City Attorney, Colonel
W. S. Devane.

The Chairman appointed as this com-
mittee Aldermen Bowden, Myers and Vol-
lers.

The Board then adjourned.

Coroner's Inquest.

This morning, while the back yard at-
tached to the house occupied by J. W.
Whitney, colored, on Third, between Bladen
and Harnett streets, was being spaded
up, the body of a newly born male infant
was exhumed.

Special Coroner A. H. Leslie was notifi-
ed, who empanelled a jury and held an
inquest. During the investigation it was
ascertained that Frances Jones, a colored
girl who is related to Whitney, was the
mother of the child and her brother,
Anthony Jones, the father. The girl
stated that the child was born on last
Wednesday night and that she buried it
soon after its birth as it was still born.

The child was examined by a physician
who corroborated the mother's statement
as to its being still born and the jury re-
ndered a verdict accordingly. Justice
Hill has issued a warrant for the arrest
of Anthony Jones, so we have been informed,
and probably new facts may be brought
to light.

Tobacco vs. Cotton.

It has been a matter of surprise that the
very low price of cotton has not induced
the farmers to substitute some other pro-
duct, which would become a more profit-
able yield. A few days ago we were in-
formed by a prominent and highly respect-
ed gentleman of Sampson county that
some of the farmers of his county had
commenced the culture of tobacco in lieu
of cotton, and as an evidence of the differ-
ence in the profits of the two articles, he
cited an instance of a gentleman who
planted one hundred and fifty acres in cot-
ton and twenty-three acres in tobacco. The
cotton brought him some four thousand
dollars and the tobacco over six thousand
dollars. Quite a difference in profit as well
as in acreage.

County Commissioners.

The following are the proceedings of
the Board of County Commissioners at
their session yesterday afternoon, in ad-
dition to those published by us last even-
ing:

It was ordered that on and after this
date the provisions of section 2, Schedule
B, Laws of 1876-'77, be strictly enforced
by the Register.

H. E. Shriver came forward and qual-
ified as Constable of Cape Fear Township.

It was ordered that the contract for
furnishing medicine for the county poor
be awarded to J. C. Munds, he being
the lowest bidder.

It was ordered by the Board that the
public road from the city limits, by the
way of Appleton to the Federal Point,
road, be discontinued.

The Board then proceeded to draw the
regular venire for the April term of the
Criminal Court, as follows:

It was ordered by the Board that the
county poll tax of \$2 25, collected by
the Sheriff on the delinquent list in Har-
nett Township, from Lemuel Williams,
be refunded, the same having been paid
by C. M. Borneman, as listed by him for
Mrs. Williams.

Application of certain residents of Har-
nett Township, in reference to the per-
formance of road duty, was not granted.

Application of certain residents of Fed-
eral Point Township, for permission to lay
out a public road in said township, was
granted on condition that the same shall
entail no expense upon the county.

The Board then adjourned until Monday,
the 17th inst., at 2 1/2 o'clock.

vineyard, and has gone to meet a happy
reward.

Report of the Chief of the Fire De- partment.

Col. Roger Moore, Chief of the Fire
Department of this city, in accordance
with a recent resolution of the Board of
Aldermen made his report, at the sitting
of the Board last night, of the different
fires occurring during the month of Feb-
ruary, and from it we extract as follows:

February 2d—Fire at the corner of
Fourth and Brunswick streets, originated
in store house of O. Russell, occupied by
J. W. Moody, extent of conflagration,
storehouse of Russell's, two dwellings ad-
joining, Brooklyn Market and house of
Allen Evans partially burned. Amount
of loss on property \$7,040. Insurance
\$4,250; cause of fire incendiary.

February 4th—Fire on the west side
of the river; originated in A. Martin's
shed, amount of loss on property trifling.
Cause of fire—accidental.

February 11th—Fire on Chestnut, be-
tween Third and Fourth streets, origina-
ted in a small frame house belonging to
the estate of S. M. West; amount of loss
on property trifling. Cause of fire—In-
cendiary.

February 18th—Fire on Third between
Nun and Church streets; originated in
house occupied by Jno. Northrop; amount
of loss on property trifling. Cause of fire—
Incendiary.

February 22nd—Fire on Church between
Second and Third streets, on roof of house
owned and occupied by T. W. Player.
Loss on property \$10—covered by insur-
ance.

February 25th—Fire at C. C. R. R. depot
25 bales of cotton partially burned;
amount of loss on property \$225—cover-
ed by insurance. Cause of fire accidental.

February 27th—Alarm of fire in Hoskin's
alley caused by burning of a chimney—no
damage.

February 28th—Fire on Front between
Church and Castle streets in house oc-
cupied by Dr. I. N. Carr. Household fur-
niture of Dr. Carr valued at \$700 destroyed.
Insured for \$300. House, property
of W. G. Fowler, valued at \$1,500 de-
stroyed. No insurance.

Magistrate's Court.

raigned before Justice E. D. Hall this
morning upon an affidavit sworn to by
Joe Whitney, charging him with a assault
and battery in two cases. The complaint
was trivial, the circumstances extenuat-
ing and the penalty was one penny and
