### A Present for Wilmington.

Under the above caption the Charleston News & Courier of yesterday's date has the following to say of a notorious hotel thief well known to the police of New York City, but who has recently been shipped from Charleston in this direction:

It will be remembered that some time since a strange white man, giving the name of DuMas, was captured by the police, being about to jump overboard from a wharf. There being no specific charge against "Jiminy" he was sent out of town last night on the North-eastern Railroad train, being booked for Wilmington. He is a decidedly impudent scamp and quite a dangerous criminal. He is probably 50 years old, with gray whiskers, is inclined to be portly, and somewhat resembles the late "Boss" Tweed.

### The Emperor William's Birthday.

Our worthy and popular friend Mr. E. Peschau, the representative at this port of His Majesty King William of Prussia and Emperor of Germany, held quite a levee at his office the Imperial Consulate this forenoon, and many were the good wishes indulged in over sparkling champagne to the Royal but venerable potentate of Prussia and Germany, the soldier of many wars and finally the Emperor of United Germany.

King William of Prussia and Emperor of Germany was born on the 22nd day of March 1797 and consequently this is the eighty-second anniversary of His Majesty's birth.

The Imperial flag of Germany was floating proudly in the breeze over the office of the Consulate, to lay in honor of the event, Mr. Peschau also sent three bottles of champagne to the officers and crew of the barque Von Heyden, Capt. Cartlow, (the only German vessel in the port) with his compliments and a request that two of them be given to the crew and the other to the officers and that they should drink to the long life of His Majesty, their Emperor.

We also notice that the flag of Great Britain is flying at the office of the British Vice Consul, Mr. Alex. Sprunt, in honor of the occasion.
