A German Prince for Bulgaria. TURNOVA, April 29—The Bulgarian Assembly of Notables today unanimously elected Prince Alexander of Battenberg, Germany, to the throne of Bulgaria, with the title of Alexander the First.

An earthquake took place in Mianeh (Persia) on the 22d of March. Twenty-nine villages were totally destroyed. Nine hundred and twenty-two persons, 2,660 sheep, 1,125 oxen, 124 horses and 55 camels were killed.
