Satchwell, of Rocky Point, left this morning. Dr. Lane is to deliver the Annual Essay on Wednesday evening. A large attendance and a session of unusual interest is expected.

The Wilmington Light Infantry will celebrate their anniversary to-morrow by a parade and target practice. They are ordered to assemble at the Armory at 2 o'clock, sharp, when the line of march will be taken up for Hilton where the target practice is to be had. The prize to be awarded to the best shot is a prize badge, made of gold, to be worn by him until the next anniversary, when it is to be turned over to whoever can win it on that day.

Bismarck and Germany

City Court.
Jas. Starkey, colored, for being drunk and down on Saturday night and obstreperous when arrested, was fined \$5—or the privilege of remaining ten days in a cell. The defendant went below.

Thos. King, colored, was arraigned for staggering under a heavy load of John Barleycorn and obstructing the sidewalk. But owing to the fact that this was his first arraignment under such a charge, His Honor suspended judgment and the prisoner was released.

Do Not Forget
That the excursion to be had on the *Passport* in connection with the dedication of the monument to the memory of the lost pilots at Smithville, takes place on Thursday next 22d, inst. The proceeds are to be applied to the benefit of the widows and orphans. After the dedicatory ceremonies the excursionists will be treated to a sail around the bay in the pilot boats, free of charge. Fatal Accident.
We learn that Mr. Eugene Hall, formerly an employe of the W. C. & A. Railroad, and son of Mr. George Hall, who was for some years the master machinist on the same road, was instantly killed on Saturday evening, the 17th inst, at Cartersville, on the W. C. & A. R. R. between Florence and Columbia. He was engaged in running a steam grist mill when the speed was such as to cause one of the millstones to burst from the centrifugal force, a fragment of which struck him on the side of the head, causing instant death. The deceased was about 28 years of age and leaves a wife and one child.

Suspension of the Sun.
Yesterday's issue of the *Wilmington Sun* did not appear, but instead, the following circular slip from the office of the paper was sent out:
THE WILMINGTON SUN,
Sunday Morning, May 18, 1879.
ANNOUNCEMENT OF SUSPENSION.
The *Sun* will appear no more, at least under the present management.
The editor does not conceive it to be necessary to make further explanation than the following:
It was intended to continue publication. The paper would have been sustained. The means with which to conduct it would have been forthcoming. But for reasons which need not be publicly stated, but which will be given to our friends and all who are interested in the failure, its Editor decided upon suspension as the wisest and most honorable course to pursue.

The editor of the *Sun* has heard that there were certain rumors in circulation affecting the conduct of the paper under him. He has learned that it has been industriously—not to say, insidiously—reported in this community that there were personal influences exerted upon the paper such as would in the very nature of things derogate from its true independence. The *Sun* has never been influenced in the slightest degree by any person whatever. Its editor alone has shaped its policy. He alone has been responsible for its course on all questions. He alone would be responsible were it to continue to be published.

CICERO W. HARRIS.
Our respectful sympathies are tendered Mr. Harris, and all concerned, in their distress. Ample experience has demonstrated the fact that the field is not large enough for the cultivation of three daily papers. The place will, perhaps, support one morning and one afternoon paper and more than this is crowding the market to such an extent that disaster and ruin are sure, sooner or later, to overtake some one. The first issue of the *Sun* appeared October 22d, 1878 and the last on the 19th inst. Its existence therefore dates but a few days less than seven months and during that period, we are free to say, it has fought a steady, earnest and disciplined fight in favor of the principles of a pure Democracy.

Uniform of Postal Officials.
A clause having been inserted in the postal appropriation bill of March 3, 1879, providing that postal clerks, route agents and mail route messengers shall not be required to wear a uniform other than a cap or badge, the Postmaster General, in view of the advantages of a uniform to the service, has issued a circular recommending those officials to continue, of their own free will, to wear the entire uniform heretofore required.

The Second Regiment.
An election is to be held in Charlotte to-morrow to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Col. Alexander, of the Second Regiment, N. C. S. G. It is likely, we think, that Lt. Col. Worth will be promoted to the vacancy and that Maj. Liles will be made Lieutenant-Colonel, this leaving the position of Major to be filled from the line officers of the Regiment. Lieutenant Thos. C. James, of the Wilmington Light Infantry, and Lieutenant J. D. Nutt, of the Whiting Rifles, expect to attend from this city.

Attempt at Arson.
Saturday evening, about dusk, an attempt was made to burn the stables on the farm of Mr. Samuel Blossom, about nine miles from this city, on the Rocky Point road. A stack of fodder which was close against the stables was fired, but was discovered by Mr. Blossom's daughter who gave the alarm in time to save it. The stables are situated about one hundred yards from the dwelling and as the servants and members of Mr. B's. house hold ran out to extinguish the fire the house was entered and robbed of a gold watch, two chains and some jewelry. Peter Bloom, colored, who was suspected, was arrested Sunday morning about 2 o'clock and is now in jail. Bloom implicated another colored man, though as there was no evidence against him save Bloom's word he was released. The prisoner states that they had decided upon a line of procedure to rob the house which was as follows: Fire the stables and attract the attention of the neighborhood to the burning building and then make a clean sweep of the valuables of the house.

Ladies' Benevolent Society.
Not willingly, but of necessity, the President feels called upon to make a plain statement of the present condition of this Society, which for more than thirty years has been active in dispensing aid as opportunity and means enabled us, to the sick and needy around us. In latter years it has become common for gentlemen to send strangers to the President or Visitors for such aid. This was not the original purpose of the organization, which at first restricted its operations to the poor of the community in sickness or some other great trouble. The amount required for membership was placed very low, in the hope that none would find excuse for failing to spare from dress or indulgence \$1.00 annually—less than two cents a week—for sustaining this branch of the Lord's Treasury. In this we have been disappointed, and now we deem it proper to let it be known that since the war the number subscribing has never exceeded, and hardly ever reached, one hundred, while the amount distributed (enlarged often by generous donations) has sometimes been more than \$200. This year we have but sixty-one subscribers on our list and fewer donations in money than usual. Consequently, after settling bills for April, we find ourselves with just \$5 remaining in the Bank.
And now it is right that we should say, with many thanks to the donors, that nearly all the provisions distributed by us during the last three months have been the gift of one firm (well known for its liberality) whom delicacy forbids us to name here; and it is only through their bounty we have wherewith to meet the claims, this month, of those whose necessities drive them to us.
Might we venture to add the request that some of the gentlemen who read this will aid us by their wise counsels, individually or otherwise, as to some suitable means of replenishing our treasury? The summer is before us, and necessities may then be more urgent. Several solicitations for a Lecture on this behalf have been unsuccessful, yet we feel assured that the Lord's Poor will be fed.
