Magistrates' News.
 Isaac Baker, one of the twins who alternate in their appearance before the Mayor, like the buckets in a well, fetched up this morning before a trial Justice charged with assault and trespass. The defendant was committed to jail until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at which time he will undergo a preliminary examination.

Personal.
 The Washington (N. C.) Press says: We are glad to see in our town Mr. Thos. Burbank, who for several years past has resided in Wilmington, but is now from New York, where he has been in attendance on the Medical University of that State. We welcome him to his old home and would be glad to have him locate permanently among us as an M. D.

Don't You Think So?
 Inasmuch as the city authorities will grant the unlimited license of the streets, sidewalks and all the private gardens in the city to the numerous cows and heifers owned in Wilmington and adjoining country, we think it is about as little as the authorities can do to let the street brigade follow up these independent cattle so as to keep the sidewalks in a decent condition for ladies to walk on.

Alumni of the Wilmington High School.
 We understand that there will be a meeting of the Alumni of the Wilmington High School, for the purposes of perfecting their organization, at the law office of Mr. Swift M. Empie, to-night. We learn also that the Society have selected Mr. Brook G. Empie to deliver an address on the 24th of this month. The place of the delivery will be determined upon to-night.

Justice to the Mexican Veterans.
 It may be of interest to the veterans of the Mexican war residing in Wilmington and vicinity, to know that the Committee of the House of Representatives, on Invalid Pensions, have agreed to report a bill granting pensions to all the surviving soldiers of this war, and their widows—without distinction as to political principles. The bill directs the Secretary of the Interior to place on the pension roll the names of surviving officers and enlisted men, including militia and volunteers of the military and naval services of the United States, who served 90 days in the war of 1846 and 1847 with Mexico. An effort will be made to pass it at the present session of Congress.

The act allows a pension of \$8 per month, but does not apply to any person who is receiving a pension at that rate, but if his pension is less than that he shall receive enough to make it \$8 per month. All persons entitled to the pension shall receive it from the passage of the act during their natural lives. Before a pension is allowed proof shall be submitted of his or her right to it, and any person making a false oath shall be stricken from the roll. The loss of a certificate of discharge shall not deprive a person of the benefits of the act, but other evidence shall be sufficient, and a land warrant granted on account of honorable service shall be taken as sufficient evidence, unless it can be proven that the warrant was fraudulently obtained. The provisions of sections 4,745, 4,746, 4,747, 4,748 and 4,766 of the Revised Statutes, are made part of the act so far as they are applicable, and no laws now in force in conflict with this act shall be applicable to the survivors of the war named, or be so construed as to deprive them of the benefits of the act. Section 4,716 of the Revised Statutes is repealed, and the act does not apply to any person while under the political disabilities imposed by the Fourteenth Amendment to the Constitution.

The Horner School.
 The Fall session of the Horner School, at Oxford, will open September 1st. It will be a mathematical, classical, scientific and military academy. Mr. Jerome C. Horner, a gentleman of attainments, well and favorably known in this city, is the principal and he will be assisted by Prof. R. W. Winston and Mr. J. H. Horners.

Judge Seymour.
 Hon. A. S. Seymour, the presiding Judge of the Superior Court now in session here, is the only remaining Republican on the bench in this State, although it is represented that he is rather conservative in his views. It is said that Judge Seymour is a nephew of the Hon. Horatio Seymour, of New York, whom we believe to be one of the purest politicians in the country North or South.

A Nice Arrangement.
 Mr. J. R. Melton, of the Second Street Market, has devised a very nice arrangement for keeping meats fresh and sweet during the summer months. By means of a large quantity of ice, generally about one thousand pounds, which, however, do not touch the meats, beef, lamb, veal, &c., may be kept cool and fresh for a week at a uniform temperature of fifty degrees. It is a nice arrangement and the most perfect means for preserving meats we have ever seen.

Mr. Melton has now on hand a fine lot of stall fed beef, lamb, veal and pork which he offers for to-morrow's marketing.
