## LOCAL NEWS.

No City Court to-day.  
To-morrow being the Fourth there will be no paper issued from this office on that day.

The two colored base ball clubs in this city will play a match game at Hilton to-morrow afternoon.

The *Passport* will go down the river to-morrow to carry a private party by whom she has been chartered.

Senator Wade Hampton passed through this city this morning from Washington City en route to his home in Columbia, S. C.

The Postoffice will be closed to-morrow from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., because of the Fourth. The mails will open and close as usual.

The Fourth will be ushered in to-morrow morning, at sunrise, by the firing of a national salute by the Cape Fear Light Artillery.

The new Presbyterian Church at Mount Olive will be dedicated on Sunday next. Rev. B. F. Marable and Rev. J. M. Spunt will officiate.

A dividend of four per cent, payable on the 10th inst., has been declared by the First National Bank in this city.

The steamer *Passport* was gaily decorated with flags yesterday and to-day, and will so remain, we presume, to-morrow in honor of the Fourth. They were all the stars and stripes.

The agreement between the grocers in regard to closing early in the evening will be suspended for to-night when they will all remain open so as to allow their customers to lay in supplies for the Fourth. This suspension of the agreement, be it understood, is "for this night only."

There was a large attendance last night on the excursion given by the Cornet Concert Club on the steamer *Passport*. There was good music, much dancing, some fine singing and a nice time generally. The moon shone bright in a clear sky and there was nothing to detract from the pleasures of the occasion. Everybody enjoyed it.

**A Table Ornament.**

They will bring with them two handsome silk marker flags which are to be presented to the Fifth Battalion.

There will be a grand excursion from Shelby to this city the latter part of this month. It will leave Shelby on the 21st, at 12 o'clock M. and arrive in Wilmington on the morning of the 22d. The excursionists will come directly through without any lay over at Charlotte and will go down to the sea while here. A friend and subscriber at Mt. Mourne, in Iredell county, referring to this excursion, writes us "Please have some good-looking reporter to go down the river with us on the 22d of July. We want some man to answer all the questions we see proper to ask and of course a newspaper man from your office will know all about it."

## Jury of Inquest.

Coroner Hewlett yesterday afternoon held an inquest over the body of Edward Smith, the young colored man who was drowned on Monday night and the finding of whose body was reported by us in yesterday's paper. The verdict of the jury was accidental drowning. The body was recovered and was carried to Princess street dock where it was viewed by many of the horror-lovers, both white and colored.

## The Fourth at Hilton.

The colored people have the old ante bellum enthusiasm for Fourth of July celebrations. They will have a picnic at Hilton to-morrow at which the colored military of this city, accompanied by their guests who are to arrive from Charleston, South Carolina to-night, will be present. Lieut.-Col. George L. Mabson, of the 5th Batt. N. C. S. G., will deliver the oration. The occasion, we learn, will be made more attractive by a barbecue, and there is every prospect of a good time for the colored population.

## Foreclosure Sale.

The foreclosure sale of the furniture of the Empire House under the second mortgage took place this morning, at 10 o'clock, and Mr. F. A. Schutte, the wholesale furniture dealer on South Front street, became the purchaser. The amount bid by Mr. Schutte was \$736. The amount of the second mortgage is, we understand, \$1,500 and the first mortgage, which will have to be lifted by the purchaser, amounts, we are told, to \$1,000, which will make the purchase money to be paid for the stock of furniture amount to \$1,736.

## Down the River.

The event of the day in the city to-morrow will be the excursion which is to be given down the river, to Smithville and the Forts, on the steamer *Waccamaw*, under the auspices of the Hibernian Benevolent Society. The *Waccamaw* has been overhauled and carefully prepared for the occasion and the Committee have omitted nothing in the way of preparation which will conduce to the comfort or enjoyment of the guests. The Italian band will furnish the music for the occasion and refreshments will be served on board at city prices. It is to be a family excursion, in the essential meaning of the word, and none need fear that they will meet on board anything of a disagreeable nature.

## The Mail Service.

It appears from orders issued to mail agents running into Charlotte, that the territory of North Carolina has been transferred from the division of which L. M. Terrell is superintendent, with headquarters in Atlanta, to that of M. V. Bailey, whose office is in Washington City, or rather all of North Carolina, except that portion traversed by the Charlotte, Columbia & Augusta and Charlotte & Atlanta Air-Line, these still being under the management of Mr. Terrell. This being the case, all letters connected with the mail routes, all complaints, and in fact, all communications relating to the railway mail service in North Carolina must be sent to Mr. Bailey, superintendent of the railway mail service, Washington City. This arrangement went into effect Tuesday, the 1st of July.

## Digest of Opinions.

We glean from the Raleigh Observer, of yesterday's date, the following digest of opinions, delivered in the Supreme Court at this term:

State vs Williams from New Hanover. Affirmed.  
The defendant was arrested on a warrant issued by a Justice of the Peace of New Hanover county, upon the affidavit of the prosecutor, a constable, charging him with committing an assault upon him (the constable) while in the execution of his official duties. On appeal to the Criminal Court, the defendant moved to quash the proceedings on the ground that the act of February 28, 1879, conferring jurisdiction on Justices, modifies or affects the offence and the warrant should conclude against the State; and for the further reason that the offence is not alleged to have been committed in New Hanover. The motion to quash was refused, and after a verdict of guilty, the defendant appealed.

Held: The motion was properly overruled. Laws conferring, withdrawing or limiting jurisdiction do not enter into and become a constituent part of the offences to which they apply.  
Held, also, the want of an averment of a proper venue is not fatal to a bill of indictment, where much greater strictness is required; it certainly cannot be deemed essential to the sufficiency of a warrant.

Von Glahn vs. DeRosier et al.; from Brunswick. Affirmed.

The Commercial Bank of Wilmington was incorporated in January, 1846, and expired by limitation of its charter in December, 1871. The charter contained a clause making the stockholders individually liable for the debts of the Bank, in case of its insolvency, to the extent of double the amount of stock held by each. The plaintiff in 1875 (and within a year from the judgments rendered against him in unsuccessful suits, in his own behalf, against separate stockholders (see Von Glahn vs Harris, N. C., and Von Glahn vs Latimer, 76 N. C.) brought this action in behalf of himself and all other creditors, &c., against the defendant stockholders, &c., against the said personal liability clause of the charter. The defendants pleaded the expiration of the charter, statute of limitations, &c. From the judgment rendered against him, the plaintiff appealed.

Held: Until the Statute (Rev Code chapter 26) was passed, a defunct corporation could at law neither be sued nor recover debts due it, but in order to appropriate its resources and means to the discharge of its obligations, the Courts of Equity interfered and gathered up the assets of the corporation, and through a receiver distributed them among the creditors. But equity which only interferred because of the absence of a legal remedy, ceased to do so when the statutory remedy was established. Section 5 of the act referred to provided that "all corporations whose charters shall expire by their own limitation, or shall be annulled by forfeiture or otherwise, shall nevertheless be continued bodies corporate for the term of three years after the time when they would have been so dissolved, for the purpose of prosecuting and defending suits, &c., and gradually to settle their business, &c. Section 6 vests, upon the dissolution, in the Court of Equity, the power upon application of a creditor or stockholder within the three years to appoint one or more trustees or receivers to take charge of the estate and effects thereof, to collect debts and property &c., and to do all other acts which might be done by such corporation, if in being, that may be necessary for the final settlement of the business &c., such powers to continue as long as the court may deem necessary.  
The relief provided by the statute is within the reach of each and every creditor and of the stockholders during the space of three years next ensuing the dissolution and no longer. The limitation is reasonable and proper in itself, and an inseparable condition of the remedy. The plaintiff has not, nor has any one who might have done so, applied for the appointment of a receiver or trustee, and thereby prolonged the corporate life under the act, and thus its benefits have been forfeited and lost by lapse of time and the plaintiff's negligence.

## Magistrate's Court.

Charles Peterson, the sea faring man who was tried yesterday before Justice Scott upon the charge of obtaining goods under false pretences, was turned over to the Work House Superintendent to serve out a term for which he has been committed there, and at the expiration of that time will be delivered into the custody of the above named Justice to receive sentence in the case for which he was tried yesterday.  
Abram McKensie was arraigned before J. C. Hill, J. P., this afternoon, upon the charge of larceny of five dollars from the Register of Deeds' office. The defendant was bound over in the sum of \$50 justified bond for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court.

The various public offices in the city, at the Custom House, the Court House and the City Hall, as well as the Banks, will all be closed to-morrow.

The Produce Exchange will be closed to-morrow in honor of the glorious Fourth.
