

CAROLINA.

The internal revenue receipts at Raleigh on Tuesday were \$238,44.

Old bonds to the amount of \$123,400 were received at the State Treasury at Raleigh for exchange on Wednesday last.

Dr Theophilus H Means, of Charlotte, died in that city on Wednesday evening at 6 o'clock.

Gov Jarvis and ex Gov Vance leave Raleigh to-day snuff the salt air together at Beaufort for a few days.

Goldboro Mail: We hear of fine rains in various sections of the State. In this locality, at Wilson and Rocky Mount it is very dry and hot.

Greensboro Patriot: Forty convicts will arrive to-night from Raleigh to be put to work with those now employed in grading on the railroad near here.

Greensboro Patriot: Mr H H Tate sowed 15 bushels German Amber wheat and realized 570 bushels, heaped measure. Five acres yielded 150 bushels, weighing 66 pounds to the bushel.

Goldboro Mail: Captain L W Vick, of New York, owns some town lots in Selma, upon which he raised 200 bushels of wheat this year.

Shelby Aurora: This section of the country was visited by refreshing rains last Sunday and Monday. The corn and cotton crops are looking better and the farmers are rejoicing.

Raleigh Observer: The Presbyterian Church at Norwood, Stanly county, N. C. will be dedicated on the fourth Sabbath of July, at 11 o'clock a. m. Services to begin on Friday before.

Raleigh Observer: Judge Eure was better yesterday, but was still confined to his room: The chances are that he will be able to hold court to-day, much to the delight of suitors and the regret of criminals.

Raleigh Observer: The amount of old bonds surrendered at the State Treasury for which new bonds have been issued, is \$2,181,100. In this are embraced bonds of the several classes exchangeable at 40 per cent and 15 per cent.

Weldon News: For the year 1878, Halifax county listed \$21,553 net incomes and profits, and \$48,448, on hand and on deposit. This is a good showing for these hard times, and is conclusive that the worst is past and good times are in the near future.

Tarboro Southerner: Col G W Hammond died in Rocky Mount on 4th inst, in the 49th year of his age. He was Colonel of the 15th Regiment N C State Troops in the war, Mayor of Rocky Mount for several terms and a Justice of the Peace for Edgecombe at the time of his death.

Farmer & Mechanic: Mr S G Worth, under instructions from His Excellency the Governor and the Commissioner, has located a permanent Hatchery at Morganton for the artificial propagation of Fish. Experience demonstrates the utility of the location at Swannana Gap, where it has been operated for the past two seasons,—hence the change.

Washington Press: Meetings are being held at the different points along the line for the purpose of making arrangements for the completion of the Tarboro & Wilmington Railroad. Committees on subscriptions were appointed at each place. All the people along the line seem enthusiastic. Enough cross-ties and bridge timber will be subscribed to build the entire line. Work will commence soon.

Farmer and Mechanic: The wheat crop has been harvested in fine condition. The quantity has been rarely equalled, while the yield has been fine throughout the State. The Commissioner earnestly requests correspondents and others to report extra yields of wheat or other crops, with such other facts as would be of interest to our farming community.

Raleigh Observer: At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the A T & O R R, held in Statesville last Thursday, Messrs W R Myers, A B Springs, T J Moore, M M Orr, C A Carlton, E B Drake and J H Reid were elected Directors, Messrs O L Sammers and J L Brown were appointed a Finance Committee and Dr J H McAden, C A Carlton and J H McEldon a Committee on proxies. Subsequently the Directors elected Col W R Myers President and J J Gormley, Esq. Superintendent.

Charlotte Observer: Mr Rhyns, the owner, and Mr Richards, the lessee, of the Duffy mine, in Gaston county, were in the city last evening, with glowing accounts of the mine. The recent suspension of operations was caused by the necessity which arose for sinking a new shaft in order to get rid of the foul air in the mine, and after this, causing a delay of twenty days, the mine is being again operated with a full force and with better prospects than ever before. The amount received for toll last month, when the mine was not run more than fifteen days—would pay 8 per cent on \$15,000 or \$18,000.

Raleigh Observer: The Governor has appointed the following gentlemen directors of the N C R R on the part of the State: C M Busbee, State Proxy; Gun R F Hoke, W F Kornegay, Dr Pride Jones, Grange; John A Gilmer, Kerr Craige, Armstead Barwell, John L Morehead and Donald McRae. Dr Pride Jones takes the place of Maj John W Graham, who was elected by the directors trustee of the sinking fund of the N C R R to succeed Rev N H D Wilson, and Col John A Gilmer takes the place of Julius A Gray, the President of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Road. The old Board was in session yesterday at Charlotte and the stockholders meet to-day in the same place. They will choose four directors on their part and the new Board will meet immediately.

Raleigh Observer: Judge Eure has rendered his decision in the now celebrated and carefully watched school bill case. He decides that the mandamus issue to compel the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House to sign the bill known as the school bill, but that the Secretary of State cannot be compelled to receive the bill until it is signed. The defendants and plaintiffs prayed an appeal to the Supreme Court and the appeal was granted. The Supreme Court will hear the case at this term.
