

THE YELLOW FEVER

No New Cases Reported and Citizens Returning to Memphis. MEMPHIS, July 15.—The first train on the Little Rock Railroad since last Friday left this morning for Lenoire, Ark., to which quarantine has been raised.

WASHINGTON, July 15.—A despatch was received to-day by the National Board of Health from Dr Mitchell of Memphis, Tenn., saying that there were no new cases of yellow fever in the State.

CAIRO, July 15.—At a meeting of the Board of Health this forenoon it was resolved that owing to the favorable news from Memphis and other parts of the South, all quarantine restrictions be suspended.

HAVANA, July 15.—The Commission appointed by the National Board of Health of the United States for the purpose of studying yellow fever symptoms, development, and treatment in Havana is prosecuting its work here assiduously.

During the last week there were 117 deaths from yellow fever in Havana. NEW ORLEANS, July 15.—The Board of Health to-day adopted a resolution rescinding quarantine against Memphis.

CAROLINA.

Col R. L. Patterson, a prominent citizen of Salem, died at his residence in that town on Tuesday of paralysis.
