The Register of Deeds has issued marriage licenses during the week to one white and three colored couples.

Col. S. L. Fremont was in the city yesterday, just from Savannah, and we acknowledge the pleasure of a short visit from him.

It has been very warm at Smithville, as well as in Wilmington during the week, but the sea breezes have been both strong and steady.

The 12 1/2 foot shark caught at Fort Fisher on Thursday, mention of which was made by us yesterday, had in his stomach two live king crabs.

Rev. N. M. Jurney will fill the pulpit of the Front Street Methodist Church at the usual hours to-morrow morning and evening.

Maj. C. M. Stedman, President of the Bank of New Hanover, Wilmington, is spending a few days in our city. ## A Marvellous Escape.

On Thursday last the little six year old son of Mr. George Hewlett, while at play with some other children in the yard of Mr. Hewlett at the Sound, ate some of the seeds of the Jamestown weed, making believe in their sport that they were grapes. In a short time the boy went into the house and complained of being unwell. The mother soon ascertained the cause of his illness and promptly administered an emetic and also a cathartic and set at once for a physician. The medicines acted favorably, but before the arrival of the doctor the complexion of the lad turned to a darker hue and he some quite spotted. It was also almost impossible to keep the little fellow awake, and it was only by constant attention and care that he was kept from sleep, which would probably have been the sleep that knows no waking. Upon the arrival of medical aid such other restoratives were applied as the urgency of the case demanded, and we are happy to state the boy is now doing well and in a fair way of an early and complete recovery. The presence of mind and courage of the mother has probably been the means of saving his young life.

## City Court.

Alderman Bowden, Mayor pro temp., presiding.

Simon Halsey, colored, was arraigned for disorderly conduct. The evidence of the four policemen who conveyed the prisoner to the Guard House was to the effect that this morning, at 8 o'clock, in the neighborhood of Hahn & Goodman's store, the defendant was drunk and disorderly, and when arrested resisted violently, cursing and abusing the police officers in the vilest manner possible, and causing them much trouble to get the prisoner to the Guard House, being compelled to carry him bodily. The sentence of the court was a fine of \$20--or thirty days in the city prison. The defendant went below.

Richard Bowden, colored, was the next case on docket. Charge--Drunk and disorderly. This proved another case of turbulence, though not so bad as the preceding one, and the acting Mayor was more lenient, passing sentence of \$25 fine--or thirty days in the city prison. This concluded the docket, and the Court adjourned.

## Bold Attempt at Robbery.

A thief made a bold attempt, about 4:30 this morning, at robbery on board the German Brig *Lienen*, lying at the foot of Orange street. Capt. H. Drees was asleep on a sofa in the cabin at the time, the mate was sleeping in a hammock on deck near the cabin door, and the steward was asleep in a bunk in the mess room. The thief took a blanket from under the head of the Captain and then robbed him of his clothing and what money was in his possession, and then robbed the mate and steward in like manner. He was discovered just as he was going over the gangway, with his plunder wrapped up in the stolen blanket, by the carpenter, who happened to be on deck at the time. The latter immediately gave chase, but the thief dropped his bundle, and having the start, succeeded in making his escape. Finding parasit useless, the carpenter returned, picking up the bundle of stolen goods on his way, and went to work trying to arouse the sleeping victims. This he accomplished after considerable difficulty. When fairly awake, they all complained of singular sensations, and as there was a strong odor of chloroform about them, it is very certain that they were subjected to its influence, while the thief engaged in his depredations. The carpenter describes him as a black man, wearing a frock coat, black hat, white shirt, and was barefooted.

## Fast Driving.

The attention of all concerned is called to the city ordinance relative to fast driving, to be found in another column of this issue; they will govern themselves accordingly. Some of the draymen who have been in the habit of rushing through the streets with unbecomingly haste are warned that they must, in the future, "hold their horses" to a specified gait, or take the consequences.

## Religious Revival.

The revival which has been in progress at the Second Baptist Church in this city, we learn, still continues with unabated interest. There will be a baptism of about 30 to-morrow, at 4 o'clock p. m., at the foot of Queen street, which will make about 40 who have professed religion and been admitted into the church since the commencement of the meetings. The services will be continued through the coming week, and possibly longer.

The little steam yacht *Elizabeth* was on the river this morning, running to and fro, the admiration of all beholders. She has been fitted up by her owner, Capt. R. P. Paddison, in a very handsome and attractive manner and is to ply between this city and Smithville. Her first trip will be made this afternoon and the programme is for her to leave in the afternoon for Smithville, returning to the city in the morning. A regular schedule will be announced by advertisement in the REVIEW in a day or two, probably on Monday.

## The Elizabeth has been fitted neatly and commodiously for the route she is to run.

She is licensed to carry forty passengers and will carry thirty with ease and comfort, and it is claimed that she will make the trip between Wilmington and Smithville in about two hours.

## Creating a Disturbance and Resisting Arrest.

Quite an excitement was created this morning at the corner of Princess and North Water streets by the arrest of Isaac Baker, one of the colored twin brothers, well known at the Mayor's Court, on account of their frequent appearance there. The fellow resisted arrest and fought manfully, biting the officer who made the arrest pretty severely on the middle finger of the left hand. He was soon overpowered, however, and thrown upon a dray when the officer, mounting the dray, sat square down on the man to keep him in position, and in this manner he was hauled to the Guard House with a large crowd following in the wake. It seems that Baker had been making himself a nuisance to some of the offices around the neighborhood referred to above by his noisy cursing and so forth, when a gentleman ordered him off and he refused to go, becoming very insolent in manner and speech. A police officer was sent for, with the result named above. Acting Mayor Bowden will interview the "gemmen" on Monday morning.

## Sheriff Manning will start the penitentiary convicts for Raleigh in charge of an officer on Monday.

The Work House convicts were turned over to Superintendent Garrett to-day.

### An Ordinance Relating to Cattle Running at Large

ORDERED, That all persons are hereby prohibited from allowing their Cows, or other cattle beasts, to run at large within the city limits, and all Cows and other cattle beasts found running at large in violation of this Ordinance shall be impounded by the Chief of Police and advertised, and the owners may redeem and recover the same, upon paying a fine of Two and One half dollars and all expenses of impounding, advertising and feeding the said Cows or other cattle beasts.

The above Ordinance was passed by the Board of Aldermen at their meeting held August 4th, 1879, and will go into effect on and after the 15th inst.
