Personal.

Col. S. L. Fremont who arrived here a few days since from Savannah, has gone to the White Sulphur Springs in Virginia, to attend the railroad convention to be held there. Col. Fremont has been appointed an arbitrator for the Georgia Central R. R. to decide a question in controversy which is to be arbitrated at the White Sulphur this week.

Death of an Important Witness.
 Henry Green, colored, was arrested in the early part of June upon the affidavit of his daughter, Hagar Green, charging him with a heinous crime, was sent to jail in default of bond for his appearance at the last term of the Criminal Court and is now in custody, as Hagar was two ill to attend Court. She died yesterday. Her evidence at the preliminary examination was taken in writing by the Justice before whom the case was investigated and is now, with all papers in the case, in the possession of the Court. Hagar was quite ill at the time of the preliminary examination.

The Obstreperous Individual.
 The colored twin, Isaac Baker, was the only case for the consideration of the Mayor *pro tem* this morning. Baker, it will be remembered by the readers of the REVIEW, acted in a very disorderly manner on Saturday, cursing and abusing the police, resisting arrest and then causing the city to furnish him with a free ride to the Guard House on a dray. Well, after the testimony the defendant was asked what he had to say, when he replied he "didn't know nothin' about it." The acting Mayor told the Clerk to record a fine of \$10 or thirty days imprisonment in a cell, and Isaac is now in the solitude of a lonely cell in the C. P.

Amusements for the Coming Season.
 Manager John T. Ford is making arrangements for a brilliant dramatic season next fall and winter, both in Baltimore and on his usual Southern circuit. The *American* says: As to his engagements he gave the following list, which comprise some of the best attractions in the musical and dramatic world: 'The Little Duke,' Edwin Booth, in a round of Shakespeare; J. T. Raymond, in George F. Bowe's dramatization of Irving's 'Rip Van Winkle'; Adelaide Nelson, who returned from Europe, and will play her new play; Hooley's 'Megatherium' Minstrels; Hermann, the Magician, who has a new and startling act this season—that of shooting a young girl out of a cannon; 'The Three Loretas,' a company on the same order as the Majittons, but pronounced to be their superiors, are also with Hermann; 'The Electric Light'; 'Mareček's Opera Company, with Miss Annie Montague; Eliza Weatherby's Frolics and Nat Godwin; Ford's Opera Company, in 'The Royal Circus'; Gott-hold's Combination in their spectacular production of 'The Octoroon,' which is similar to the revival of 'Uncle Tom's Cabin.' They bring their own scenery and a large number of negroes. Mrs. Alice Oates and her original company, including Drew and Howson; French Opera, with Aimee and Capoul; Barney McCauley, in 'Messenger from Jarvis Station'; Haverley's Mastodon Minstrels; Buffalo Bill and Combination; the famous Haulon Family, who make their first appearance in America after a number of years' absence—they have a performance similar to the Yokes Family; Kiralfy's 'Black Crook,' and Gilbert & Sullivan's new opera, the name of which has not been announced as yet. Mr. Ford produces this opera at the Fifth Avenue Theatre, New York, the 1st of December. Negotiations are pending with Carl Rosa for an engagement of his opera troupe, and also with H. J. Sergeant and H. O. Jarrett for a number of the attractions they expect to import this season. Mr. Ford will have besides his opera company two dramatic companies—one to support his stars when they play at the Opera House here, and one engaged especially to support Booth on his Southern tour. The first company start with Jefferson September 1st, and is composed of Miss Henrietta Vaders, Miss Eugenia Paul, Miss Lillian Spencer, Messrs. C. Waverly, Samuel Phillips, E. J. Moroso, James Galloway and Henry Taylor. The troupe start from Richmond, travel South, then West, also playing in New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore. The season promises to be interesting.

A Christian Pleasure.

We announced on Saturday that a telephonic communication had been made between the pulpit of the First Presbyterian Church and the residence of Col. John D. Taylor, for the benefit of an invalid lady residing there, whose infirmities prevented her attendance upon Divine worship. By the aid of the telephone she sat in her room yesterday and heard every word of the service, including the reading the prayers, the sermon, and could even distinguish the softest tones uttered, and even the different voices composing the choir. The distance was about six blocks. Gen. Taylor, the Agent for the Bell Telephone Company, had the necessary instruments placed in position last week. The transmitter in the church was placed near the pulpit and that at the house near a lounge on which the lady reclined.

The Grays' Excursion.
 The Charlotte Grays leave here in a coach attached to the regular train on the Carolina Central Railroad next Monday evening. They will sell a limited number of tickets at \$3 for the round trip. Tuesday the excursionists will spend in Wilmington; Wednesday they will go down the river to Smithville and over the bar on the pleasure yacht *Passport*. A band of music will be on the boat, and those who wish to dance will be given the opportunity. Thursday they will go to Wrightsville Sound, and that evening turn their faces homeward. This excursion offers many pleasures to the Grays and friends, but no greater than will be realized. All who wish to go must get tickets to day, as none will be sold after this evening.—*Charlotte Observer*.

Conditions of Health.
 The prime conditions of health in a house, says the health officer of Washington, D. C., depend upon cleanliness, pure air and unpolluted water, the prompt and thorough removal of all refuse, and the perfect exclusion of all foul matters arising outside the house. Good ventilation is absolutely necessary. Rooms should be frequently aired, and a daily visit from Dr. Sunshine encouraged. Overcrowding is a fruitful source of air-pollution in dwellings. Zealous attention should be paid to cellars, pantries and passages. Mold, dampness and foul smells are never to be neglected. The sun's rays, free ventilation and a lavish use of whitewash are excellent scavengers. The floors of dwellings should be frequently washed. Choose for this purpose a dry day, doors and windows to be left open during and after the operation until thoroughly dry. The floors of dwellings should always be raised from three to four feet above ground, so as to insure perfect ventilation beneath, and the site should be higher than the surroundings, so as at all times to prevent dampness or presence of stagnant water.
