Change of Affairs.

Mr. B. A. Blundon, Assistant Signal Officer at Smithville, has been ordered to Jacksonville, Florida. During Mr. Blundon's short stay at Smithville he has attached to himself the people of that village by his gentlemanly and courteous manners. We trust he may be pleasantly situated at his new station, where he will be only on temporary duty. Mr. J. C. Carroll will assist Sergeant Seyboth at Smithville.

Reduced the Assessments.

The County Commissioners, Assessors and Magistrates of Brunswick county met in Smithville on Monday, in accordance with the law, to revise the assessments on property in the county. That portion of the Wilmington, Columbia & Augusta Railroad running through the county was originally assessed at \$4,300 per mile. Capt. Jno. F. Divine, the Superintendent of the road, attended the meeting of the board and by arguments and hard work succeeded in having the assessment reduced to \$3,000 per mile.

The C. C. Railway and the County Commissioners.

In publishing the proceedings of the County Commissioners in yesterday's REVIEW we stated that "Major D. J. Deyane made a very able argument before the Board in regard to taxing the rolling stock and other property of the C. C. Railway which has never paid taxes under any previous administration." This, we understood to be correct at the time--but we have since learned that the only point of issue between the C. C. Railway and the Commissioners is whether the rolling stock of the Railway Company shall be considered as personal property and as such be listed for taxes.

City Court.

Lawrence Royal, colored, was arraigned for being drunk and disorderly, and sentenced to pay a fine of \$5 or go to prison for fifteen days.
Joanna Taylor, colored, for being drunk and resisting police, was fined \$5.
Larry Doyle, for being drunk and down in the streets, was told to leave \$2 50 with the City Treasurer.
Charles Harper, colored, was arrested this morning for retailing chickens on Brunswick, between Third and Fourth streets, which it is alleged were not honestly obtained, other parties having come forward and claimed said property. The prisoner was turned over to the tender mercies of a trial Justice for an examination and investigation.

Tobacco in Pender County.

Dr. Walter C. Murphy, on his professional rounds in the Angola section of Pender and Onslow counties, saw specimens of tobacco growing as fine as any ever produced in Granville county. A large belt of country in that section, known as the "White Oak," rich in fertility and inexhaustible in quantity, is celebrated not only for its large crops of corn but produces cotton and tobacco as well. This magnificent body of swamp land lies immediately upon the line of the proposed railroad from Burgaw to Onslow, and will be penetrated by it. Dr. Jacob James, upon whose farm this tobacco was seen, has also in his possession a walking cane and decanter brought to this country in 1877. His father, Mr. John James, a descendant of the first settlers of this county, owned at his death 20,000 acres of land in one body.

RALEIGH, August 27, 1879.
WHEREAS, official information has been received at this Department, that William J. Walker, alias "Buc" Walker, late of the county of Pender, stands charged with murder; and whereas it appears that the said William J. Walker, alias "Buc" Walker, has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him,
Now therefore, I, THOS. J. JARVIS, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue this my proclamation offering a reward of Two Hundred Dollars for the apprehension and delivery of the said William J. Walker, alias "Buc" Walker, to the Sheriff of Pender county, at the Court House in Burgaw, and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.
Done at our City of Raleigh, the 22d day of August, 1879, and in the One Hundred and Fourth year of American Independence.
