### The August Number

### Improvements.

### Cool and Comfortable.

What we got yesterday in the way of weather was the fog end of the storm which has been having such a good time down in Texas, as foretold by the Signal Office. It was cool enough here for thicker clothing than has been worn in four months past, and last night blankets and fires were found comfortable. To-day the weather is bright and beautiful, but the atmosphere is still cool and bracing. At 10 o'clock, this forenoon, the thermometer was at 73.

### A Sad Anniversary.

To-day twelve months ago the citizens of Wilmington were called upon to mourn the death of a prominent citizen of this place, Capt. I. B. Grainger, whose funeral services were celebrated in St. John's Church in this city, on the 28th of August of last year, the remains having reached here on the cars the night previous from Pennsylvania, where Captain Grainger was visiting relatives at the time of his sudden illness and untimely death.

### Stolen Property Recovered.

A yawl boat belonging to the German barque *Shanghai*, lying at Messrs. Williams & Murchison's wharf, between Orange and Ann streets, was stolen last night and taken, no one knew whither until the Captain offered a reward of two dollars for its recovery, when it was soon discovered lying near Messrs. Kidder & Sons' steam saw mill in the lower end of town, and conveyed back to the barque by two colored men, each of whom claimed the reward, his individual self. The Captain settled the matter by giving each a dram—of spirits and they departed satisfied.

### Pretty Things in Jewelry.

Among the pretty things now in French jewelry the few shapes for ladies' pins are especially noticeable. These are little fans of silver or silver gilt, with the tops of enamel, and on them are painted little Japanese figures or wreaths of flowers. The sticks forming the ends of the fan are set with turquoises, and there are little tassels of gold or silver pendant to them. Some of these pins combine that which is ornamental; they present half-closed fans, the ends being little mirrors shaped like tiny hand-mirrors set in silver filagree borders and large enough to reflect a stray curl or an additional freckle. There are also little rosecap fans with mirrors set in the centre, surrounded by imitation feathers in filagree work.

### Twice Stolen.

Charles Harper, colored, was arrested yesterday morning for the larceny of chickens, the property of Mr. Patrick Carr. Shortly after the theft was committed Mr. Carr missed his chickens and instituted a search for them among the bucksters in the market and came upon them just after Harper had sold them. He was arrested, the money turned over to the purchaser and the chickens to Mr. Carr, who sent them back to his house. Harper was remanded to jail in default of bond for his appearance at a preliminary investigation before a magistrate this morning. Some one else took a fancy to the chickens last night and stole them and up to the time of our going to press Mr. Carr had not recovered them.

### Co-Jurers and Costs.

A case of conjuring was tried before Justice Hall this afternoon, but we could not ascertain what statute had been violated. A man complained of being sick when one Henderson remarked that he would shuffle his cards and shake his bones and see what he could do for him. The cards were cut three times which, according to conjuring lore meant that three perogoric pills should be taken, at night. The bones were shaken and examined and four paragoric pills were prescribed for the next day. The subject of conjuring was spoken of to-day before Abo McKenzie, who swore out a warrant against the alleged conjurer. The warrant was served and the case dismissed upon the payment of costs by the parties interested.

### New Cotton.

Messrs. Williams & Murchison received by the 5 o'clock freight train on the C. C. Railway yesterday afternoon from Mr. N. M. Gibson, at Laurel Hill, Richmond county, the first bale of new cotton that has been received in this market this year. The bale was weighed by Mr. Geo. H. Kelly, cotton weigher, and brought down the scales at 435 pounds. It was classed as middling cotton and sold for 12 1/2 cents per pound.

Messrs. E. Lilly & Bro. also received by the passenger train on the C. C. Railway this morning a bale of new cotton shipped by Messrs. McCaskell & McLean, from Laurinburg. The bale weighed 503 pounds and was classed as strict low middling. It will go forward on steamship *Benefactor* to-morrow or next day, for New York, when it will be placed on the market for sale.

### The John A. Griffin.

We are glad to learn that the schooner *John A. Griffin*, concerning whose safety much anxiety has been felt in this city, since the recent storm, is safe. She arrived off Smithville at about sunset last night and came to an anchor outside. She has laid outside during the day, and will be brought in as soon as the tugs can be spared to go to her. They have been busy during the day towing out the fleet of vessels that were at Smithville. From all we can learn through the courtesy of the Signal officers, the schooner is all right and may be expected up in a day or so.

This news will give much satisfaction to the many friends of the two young gentlemen, Messrs Davis and Dyer from this city, who were on board of her, and must afford intense relief to the anxious hearts of the parents, relatives and friends who have passed days in an agony of suspense regarding the irate.
