Quince and Apple Jelly.

New Hansver County, N.C.

Take equal quantities of quince and apples, stew them separately till tender (the quinces will take the longest), strain the juice, mix it, and to every pound of juice allow three quarters of a pound of pounded sugar; proceed as for quince

To Make Soft Soap.

Twenty pounds of pure grease to 14 pounds of potash will make a clean fish barrel full; the potash I procure at the wholesale drug store; dissolve it in water in a brass kettle over the fire; put the grease in the barrel; first pour the solution of potash over the grease, and stir it with a stick; let it stand 24 hours, then pour a pail of cold water in the barrel and stir it thoroughly; let it stand 12 hours, and as it thickens add a pail of cold water and stir again, and add water every twelve hours and stir until the barrel is full. In cold weather we use warm water. Be particular to have the barrel tight, as lye will leak through where water will not. A barrel will not answer more than twice as the lye de-
