**The Solicitor's Opinion on the Road Question.**

As there have been numerous arrests and trials before the county Justices recently for failure to work the road in this county, we understand that Mr. Solicitor Moore has made a careful examination of the law bearing upon the question and has given it as his opinion that the Magistrates have no jurisdiction in such cases, owing as the Solicitor expresses it, to a technicality in the wording of the law.

Col. Moore states that he has no doubt it was the intention of the legislature to invest the Magistrates with the authority to try these cases, but in framing the bill, the phraseology was such as to preclude their legal right to assume final jurisdiction in the matter under the constitution.

Toby Williams, colored, was arrested by Sergeant G. W. W. Davis, in the Postoffice, just before daybreak yesterday morning, under suspicious circumstances. The defendant was ordered turned over to U. S. Commissioner for trial.

Thos. Foy, colored, arrested in the act of stealing cabbages from a cart in the market, this morning, was given over to the courtesy of Justice Hall for trial.

This finished the docket, and the Court adjourned.

**Falmam qui Merat, Ferat.**

There recently appeared in the Charleston News & Courier the report of a Committee appointed by the citizens of Columbia to gather testimony and information in regard to the burning of that city by Gen. Sherman. It is a very complete and interesting history of this worst of Sherman's many deeds of infamy, and portions of the sad story have been copied by several of our papers. It was first published complete in the Philadelphia Times.

The history of the subject itself, and how it got into print, is of sufficient interest perhaps to bear telling:

The committee, of which Chancellor J. P. Carroll was chairman completed their report not very long after the close of the late war. It was deemed inexpedient to publish it, in the then condition of things, and for its safety and preservation the report was filed away among the city archives.

A short time after Columbia passed under the rule of the carpet-bag regime, and by some of these worthies the report was probably made away with. At least it could never be found after they came into power, and as it contains much that must be very unpalatable to such gentry, they doubtless hoped by its destruction to blot out the damning record. Fortunately one or two copies had been preserved by members of the committee, and a short time ago, a gentleman of this city, who had long sought vainly for the report succeeded in obtaining a copy of one of these copies. This was put in proper shape for the press, and was published in the Philadelphia Weekly Times of June 21st and thus the record was preserved and given to the public.

Our friend, who was instrumental in procuring the publication of the report, gave the REVIEW a copy of the Times containing it some time ago, and to the same person the News & Courier owes its knowledge of the existence of the article. The News & Courier printed the report in full—but, inadvertently, we are sure, neglected to give the proper credit for it.
