**The Jasper Centennial.**

SAVANNAH, Oct. 9, 1879.

## EDITOR REVIEW.

The Jasper Centennial, which is being celebrated in this city to-day, is a tremendous success. The streets have been thronged all day and there are two thousand troops in line. Gen. La Fayette McLaws is the Chief Marshal and Gen. Jno. B. Gordon the Orator. At this time, 2 o'clock, Gen. Gordon is speaking and he is being listened to by twenty thousand people. The "Spirit of '76" is not yet dead in Savannah.

## Marl from Columbus County.

Yesterday's *Charlotte Observer* says: Capt. T. L. Vail, chairman of our board of county commissioners, has just returned from a visit to Columbus county and brought back with him a sample of shell marl which he proposes to send to the State chemist for analysis to test its fertilizing properties. Capt. Vail is of the opinion that this marl can be used by farmers in this section of the State to great advantage, should it prove as strong a fertilizer as he anticipates. His idea is to use it with acid phosphate instead of using cotton seed. Large bodies of it are found near Robeson station, on the Carolina Central Railway, and it has been used by the farmers there with great success. Capt. Vail says it can be gotten out and delivered to the depot at the rate of 25 cents per barrel, thus showing that the cost of transporting into this section will be very light. There is no doubt as to the existence of a sufficient amount of the marl to meet a very heavy demand.

## Arraigned for Burglary.

Daniel Richardson, colored, was this morning arraigned in the Criminal Court upon the charge of burglary, which crime is alleged to have been committed in this city on the night of the 29th ult., upon the premises of J. C. Walker, colored. The prisoner being financially unable to procure counsel, the Court assigned Messrs. E. S. Martin and Jno. D. Bellamy, attorneys, to conduct the defence. In accordance with the expressed wish of the Judge appointed Saturday, the 11th inst., at 9 o'clock, as the time for the trial to commence. The Court then ordered the Sheriff to summons a special venire of fifty men, from which to select a jury. Burglary is a capital offence according to the laws of this State, and if the prisoner is found guilty, the gallows will be his end, unless he is saved by the interposition of executive clemency.

**Hard Work.**

**Criminal Court.**  
The attention of the Court to day has been occupied for the most part in hearing arguments upon the question of jurisdiction on the public road cases, in consequence of which, the following are the only cases tried and disposed of up to the present writing:  
State vs A. B. Lind, charged with carrying concealed weapons. Verdict not guilty.  
State vs. Margaret McCumber, charged with assault and battery. Verdict not guilty.

**The Chufa Played Out.**  
Spanish chufa is a failure. At least it is so pronounced by many who have given it what they consider a fair test. Some of the Pender county farmers who have tried it thoroughly for two seasons past tell us that they have planted the last of it. They say that it not only does not make good meat but that it draws from the ground where it is planted every particle of life and sustenance, leaving an almost barren waste where was once fruitful fields. It is true that the hogs take to it kindly but the fat of the meat raised on it is so soft that the pork, as such, is almost unsaleable and the meat, after being cured, will continue to drip as long as there is any grease left in it. One instance is related of a farmer who fed with it very extensively last year and who has never yet been able to get the lard into anything but a liquid state. He calls it, very properly, hog oil. There will be very little of the Spanish chufa planted in this section next year.

**The Firemen's Anniversary.**  
The parade of the White Fire Department of this city, spoken of by us in yesterday's issue as being under progress at the time of our close, was carried out according to the programme laid down by the Committee, attracting the attention of crowds of people all along the route. The companies participating were the Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Co., the Howard Company and the Hook and Ladder Company, the latter with their truck and the others with their steamers, the apparatus being beautifully decorated with flowers and evergreens. A pleasing incident of the procession was a photograph taken of it by Mr. Orr, the photographer, in front of Yates' book store, on Market street. At the close of the procession the members all repaired to the Little Giant Engine House where a very nice collation, with the palatable accompaniments had been spread for their benefit.
