To-morrow is the all-important day in Ohio. To-morrow night the verdict will be rendered whether in the 'Ohio idea' a soldier's brilliant record, or a store keeper's money, making exploits are the most worthy the confidence, esteem and honor of the people.

All the clerks from Ohio, in Washington, of Republican proclivities, and there are none other, have gone home to vote. They have been bled freely to carry on the campaign, and could ill afford the expense incident to the trip, but John Sherman's alternative was 'go or resign, and they chose the latter.'

DEBT COMMISSIONERS.

Yesterday's Raleigh Observer says: Gov Jarvis has appointed as commissioners under the act providing for the adjustment of that portion of the State debt which is a lien upon her stock in the North Carolina Road, the following gentlemen: Hon. George Davis, of Wilmington, Montford McGehee, of Person, and Donald Bain, of Wake. We commend the Governor for these appointments. The names of the commissioners guarantee a careful and honest discharge of the duties devolving upon them under the law. We hope they will accept.

The bonds to be retired are quoted in the last number of the Financial Chronicle at 1.06 1/2 coupons on, and at 86 1/2 with coupons off. The new North Carolina 4 per cents were quoted at 58 to 62. It would seem therefore that unless the lien upon the stock, proposed to be given to the new bonds, shall add very largely to their market value, the commissioners will have considerable difficulty in coming to terms of adjustment with the bondholders, who in this case have as much control as the State had in settling the unsecured debt.

HARD PAN.

An English banker, Mr. Newmarch, who has been bringing Tooke's History of Prices down to date, has reached the conclusion that prices are now lower than at any time since 1850, having very nearly fallen to the figures of twenty-nine years ago. From 1850 to 1864, Newmarch finds that prices increased 72 per cent; since then they have fallen off, and stood in December, 1878, only 4 per cent above the point at which they started. This return of current prices to their original level has taken place in spite of an enormous increase in the circulating medium of civilized countries. The production of the precious metals since 1850 amounts to \$4,500,000,000, and the volume of paper money in England, France, Germany and the United States, has risen from \$375,000,000 to \$1,473,000,000, facts which must make it extremely doubtful whether prices are as much affected by the state of the currency as has been supposed.

OFFICIAL STEALING.

It might naturally be presumed that even if the subordinate officials and employees of the government did dip their hands into the public treasury without authority of law, whenever opportunity offered, those high up in official position, upon whom is conferred the responsibility of chiefs and heads of departments, would keep themselves clear of suspicion of engaging in the works of public plunder. But such is not the fact. The most impudent and barefaced thieves in the employ of the government are among those who are highest in official position, and upon whom is placed the gravest responsibility. With the fimsiest and most gazy pretense of official necessity, they plunder thousands of dollars from the public funds for their own personal advantage. It is truly astonishing to what an extent such wholesale robberies are being carried on. If one of those high officials wishes to have a pleasure trip, he makes 'official business' a pretext for a raid upon the Treasury to pay his expenses. To illustrate: Last year John N. Tyner, First Assistant Postmaster General, took his family and one or two subordinates in the Post-office Department, to the Paris Exposition, at a cost to the government of about \$10,000. The plea upon which he drew this money was a so-called international postal convention, but if there was any such convention held we are none the wiser, for no report of its proceedings has ever been made by Mr. Tyner, and there is none on file in the Department.

At a later date the same high official, accompanied by the Third Assistant Postmaster General and his family, made a trip to the Pacific coast, ostensibly to look after improvement in the postal service,

but in reality for pleasure and recreation. For this expensive picnic the Treasury was bled to the tune of \$6,000.

Mr. Tyner was also absent on another of these junketing tours at the time of the Thornburgh disaster, but he escaped unharmed. The expenses of the trip will be paid out of the public Treasury, as in the former instances. Whenever any of these high officials desires to make a trip of pleasure or profit, he only has to make the plea of 'official necessity' to make a raid upon some of the appropriations to cover the expense.

Mr. Blackfan, superintendent of foreign mails, has made several trips to Europe at the public expense, ostensibly in the interest of the postal service, but in reality for his own pleasure. His missions have resulted in no benefit to the country which might not have been equally as well attained by the ordinary channels of correspondence, and no outlay of expense which could not have been settled by a few postage stamps.

In this way thousands of dollars are actually filched from the pockets of the tax-payers every year, and every year there is an increase in the amount thus plundered. Year after year the deficit in the Postoffice Department grows larger, but no enquiry is made as to the cause of all this extra expense.

As in the Department we have named, so it is in every other, and we hope, that, before the committee on all appropriations should again recommend the voting of one dollar's worth of supplies, they will investigate all the extra expenses of all officials of the different departments, and see if some method may not be devised by which to put an end, or at least a check, to this outrageous plunder of the public funds without authority of law.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10, 1879.

There seems to be no end to Senator Conkling's misrepresentations of the subject of Government taxes. In his Brooklyn speech on Wednesday night he said that New York alone paid one-third of the Government's expenses. With equal truth he might have said that the square in which the Custom House in New York City is situated paid one-third. The money is actually paid there. But it is not New York that pays the money, but consumers throughout the country. The money is paid in New York to be sure, that is all.

The substance of the recent Post-office Department decision concerning lottery mails is that letters will not be forwarded which are addressed to a lottery company, or to a person as manager or agent of a lottery company. The Department does not assume to stop letters addressed simply to individuals, though such persons be known to the Postmaster as the manager or agent of a lottery company.

Our latest information from New York, through reliable sources, is that the Democratic party is daily growing in strength and that notwithstanding the Tammany defection the Democracy are confident of their re-election of Gov Robinson and the entire State ticket by a handsome majority. His management of the finances of the State while Comptroller, and while in the executive chair, has been entirely successful, and has done much in reducing taxation and the expenses of the State government which, under the many years of Republican misrule and profligate legislation, had become exceedingly oppressive to the tax payers of the State, and has given him a strong hold on the people of the State and more especially those of the interior sections of it, who will at this important juncture cast their ballots regardless of party feeling, believing as they do that the best interest of the State requires at its head a man of Gov. Robinson's honesty and integrity in preference to one who for years has been known to be identified with nearly all the corrupt schemes for depleting the public treasury.

Large numbers of the reflecting and thinking members of the Republican party, who have the interest and welfare of the people at heart, repudiate the nomination of Cornell and will cast their ballots for Robinson who has been tried and fully answers the old Jeffersonian requirement—'is he honest and is he capable?' The number of honest and independent Republicans who will support Robinson, will to a large extent offset the numbers who will follow John Kelly. GURDGE.

Death of a Noted Divine.

Died, at the family residence, Hopkinsville, Ky, Sept 30th, 1879, in his 79th year, the Rev Gideon B Perry, D. D., L. L. D., late rector of Grace Episcopal Church in that city; formerly rector of Trinity Church, Natchez, Miss; first rector of St Paul's, Cleveland, Ohio; for some time at Grace Church there, and founder of St James Parish, Cleveland, also. The Rev Dr Perry was the last surviving kinsman cotemporary of Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry, the hero of the battle of Lake Erie. Both were natives of South Kingston, Rhode Island, and born under the same roof; the Rev Dr on Oct 12th, 1800, some years junior of the other. Dr Perry, for more than fifty-seven years in the Christian Ministry, was a prominent divine of the Church, and stood high, especially for force and pulpit eloquence. The Key Henry G Perry, of the Episcopal City Clergy, Chicago, is a son of the deceased. The Rev Dr Perry leaves a family, his widow and three children surviving him.
