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NEWS AND REVIEWS.

The Kladderadatsch of Berlin advises the English Government to promote the King of the Zulus to the rank of General, and make him commander-in-chief of the English armies in Afghanistan.

The trial of a copyright lawsuit in Washington brings out the fact that one printer has, within a year, furnished thousands of counterfeiters of foreign champagne labels to put on American wine.

A Cleveland fire engine, with four men on it, was driven off an open drawbridge forty feet into the water. The men were rescued, but the horses were held to the bottom by the heavy machine and drowned.

Miss Maud Banks, daughter of Gen. Banks, has made her debut at Brookline, Mass., as an actress in an amateur company. She intends to go on the professional stage. The General was once an actor.

The novel engineering feat of building a bridge on shore and then shoving it across the river has been accomplished at Dinard, France. The structure is 314 feet long, weighs 200 tons, and was projected into its place with twelve strong windlasses.

A curious experiment was made with cats recently in Lattich, Germany. Thirty-seven of them were put into bags and taken several miles into the country, where they were released. Within three hours the first cat had found its way home, and before 24 hours had elapsed, every one of the others had returned.

The Boston Police Commissioners, in whom is vested the power of licensing shows in that city, have decided to permit no performances by children. The case at issue was that of a juvenile 'Uncle Tom's Cabin' company. A Massachusetts statute authorizes such a prohibition.

It might be supposed that a deaf and dumb man and wife would not quarrel; but Mr. and Mrs. Goodwin of Greensburg, Ind., deaf mutes, lived four years in noiseless disagreement, and finally had a desperate parting fight, in which he was scalded and her skull was fractured.

Tray to boggin is the new rainy day country house pastime in England. You take a substantial large wooden tray to the top of a flight of stairs, sit in it, hold on well to the sides and let yourself go. If you manage well, you slide right down; if you don't, you twist and are tumbled over. Ladies are said to do it best.

The tax collector of San Francisco, finding it impossible to collect the tax on a Chinese hospital in that city, levied on a wooden god or idol that he found in the building. The speed with which the terrified Chinamen produced the money and restored the god to its place showed plainly that it was a deity of considerable influence on Chinese fortunes in the next world.

Gen. Arthur, a leading New York Republican politician, expresses a belief that Cornell will run nearly 100,000 votes ahead of Robinson, and that the rest of the ticket will have a majority of 20,000 or 30,000. He thinks that the Democrats have given up all hope of electing Robinson, and will devote themselves mainly to endeavoring to elect Mr. Potter and the rest of their ticket.

Benjamin Devries, one of the wealthiest men of Columbus, Ohio, became suddenly possessed of an impulse to get off the street car in which he had started for his office. He wandered to St. Louis, he says, and for a week was only vaguely conscious of who and where he was. At length he read a newspaper account of his disappearance, slowly realized that the name was his own, and went back home. He has since been completely restored to health.

It is said that an investigation of the New York elevated railroads revealed that the stock has been "watered" to the extent of six or seven million dollars. During the investigation some interesting statistics were given. The fifteen miles of track now in operation cost twelve millions of dollars, and when the construction is thoroughly completed it is thought that the expense will be fully a million dollars to each mile of track. A car costs \$3,400; an engine over \$5,900. The New York Bulletin of Friday says: 'At the Stock Exchange we had another day of excitement and wide fluctuations. It is worthy of mention, as illustrating how far values relate to prices, that Jersey Southern stock advanced to 7 1/2, Boston, Hartford and Erie to 6 on the street, and Spruce Hill to 7. The joke of all this is, that these stocks have been extinguished by foreclosure proceedings and at present have no legal existence. They serve, however, as counters in the betting game that rules the hour.'

THE ENGLISH MISSION.

It would seem that Mr. Everts has so far fallen under the displeasure of Mr. Hayes that he has been invited to accept the position of Minister at the Court of St. James. In other words the offer, in reality, amounts to an invitation to retire from the Cabinet.

Mr. Everts was the principal attorney for the Republican side of the question before the infamous Electoral Commission, and it was through his exertions, more than those of any other individual, that the seat was secured to Mr. Hayes. Like all the rest who participated in the steal, Mr. Everts was rewarded. He was made Secretary of State and his relations with his chief have been supposed to be of the most pleasant character, until this rumor that he had been offered the English Mission became established as a matter of fact. At first it could hardly be believed, but all doubts are now removed, as Mr. Hayes has actually tendered him that position. Whether Mr. Everts will accept or not we are unable to say, as he is holding the matter under consideration for the present. But whatever he may ultimately conclude upon, it is not probable that, under the circumstances, he will much longer continue in the Cabinet.

For this unlocked for action on the part of Mr. Hayes, there is a cause which is as yet not made apparent, unless the recent backdown of his Secretary of State to the behests of Mr. Conkling furnish the clue, which looks very probable. It is well known that Mr. Conkling has been at loggerheads with his Fraudulency and his cabinet ever since their induction into office, and that he has manifested his contemptuous disgust of them on every possible occasion, and in every possible manner. This disgust ripened into the intensest hatred when his particular friend, Mr. A. B. Cornell, was removed from the New York Custom House. There is no doubt that Cornell was removed as a retaliation for the slights Conkling had put upon the administration. At any rate, it caused the proud and arrogant Senator from New York to assume a position as the leader of a powerful faction to wage a bitter and relentless war upon Mr. Hayes and his administration. He resorted to no subterfuge in the matter, but came out openly and defiantly. He dictated the nomination of Mr. Cornell to the New York Republican State Convention, as the candidate of the party for gubernatorial honors. It was well known beforehand that Cornell was the choice of Conkling, and all the powers of the administration were employed to defeat that object, but without effect. Although the nomination of Cornell was a victory over Hayes and his friends, the triumph was not yet complete. Mr. Conkling had no idea of leaving his work of humiliating his opponents half-done. He had beaten them by forcing upon them a candidate in every way displeasing to them—one whom they had removed from office, ostensibly to carry out the plan of civil service reform, but in reality to punish Mr. Conkling for his antagonism—and he would not be satisfied until his bitterest foes had taken the stump in favor of his candidate. This he has accomplished, and Mr. Everts, the chief adviser in the Cabinet, is now in New York, earnestly advocating the election of Mr. Cornell; and even Mr. Hayes has said that, if he lived in that State, he should vote for him.

It is a dish of crow, served up by Mr. Conkling expressly for Mr. Everts, which the latter has been obliged to swallow with apparent grace and gusto. That it has been distasteful and disgusting to both Hayes and Everts is perfectly evident. That it was a dose which they felt compelled to swallow is also perfectly evident. Whether the plan adopted by Mr. Everts in taking the stump for Cornell, meets with the approbation of Mr. Hayes is a question. At any rate it would seem that Mr. Conkling has succeeded in putting the administration in an unpleasant dilemma, and that the retrial of Mr. Everts from the cabinet may be possibly attributable to his strategy. If this should be the cause and there are strong indications that it is, Mr. Conkling will have the satisfaction of knowing that he has wounded the administration in its most sensitive part, and has forced his most bitter enemy from the cabinet, and for awhile at least from the country.

For the Review. Burgaw & Onslow Railroad. MR. EDITOR:—Are you aware that strenuous efforts are being made by Newbern to secure the trade and business of Onslow county? The closing up of New Inlet shuts out Onslow county in the main from Wilmington, and Newbern now seeks to get what Wilmington loses in this relation. The location of Onslow geographically favors this anxiety and determination of the merchants and business men of Newbern to profit by the closing of New Inlet, and they are already succeeding as never before in obtaining the import and export trade of Onslow and Carteret that was until recently was the trade and advantage of our own city of Wilmington. The most effectual means of diverting this state of things,

and again securing for Wilmington all and more than she has lost, by the closing of New Inlet, is to build the Burgaw & Onslow Railroad, as proposed in the admirable charter obtained for its construction from the last Legislature. The incorporators are not idle, but are determined to build the road. Wilmington is interested in the manner and relation stated. If she neglects the opportunity now offered she will not show that regard for her commercial prosperity and best interests that is demanded, and the future will show she was slumbering when her citizens should have been wide-awake and active.
