River News.

very suddenly last night of heart disease.
Old Uncle Andrew was to all appearance
in his usual health yesterday and attended
church twice during the day. Just after
returning to his home from church ser-
vices last night he went to bed and died
in a very few minutes.

Ashore on the Beach
The Norwegian brig *Prosperita*, Cap-
tain Beruldsen, which cleared from Lon-
don for this port on the 25th of Septem-
ber, went ashore on the beach at New In-
let, near Fort Fisher, at 1 a. m. to-day.
The Captain, we understand, mistook the
Federal Point Light for the Frying Pan
Shoals Lightship. The brig was loaded
with ballast and consigned to Mr. R. E.
Heide, the Norwegian and Danish consul
for this port.

Consul Heide, in company with others,
left here this afternoon on the steamer
Passport for the scene of the wreck.

Nipped in the Bud.
Last night about 8 o'clock, roundsman
Weisse discovered a two-story house, on
the Northwest corner of Third and Church
streets, owned and occupied by Hector
Davis, colored, to be on fire. He gave the
alarm to the inhabitants, who with the aid
of others succeeded in extinguishing the
fire with a few buckets of water. There
was no general alarm, but for a short time
considerable excitement prevailed in the
neighborhood. The weather—boarding in
the second story of the building was on fire
when discovered, and it is thought that the
fire originated from an imperfect flue.
Damage very light.
