Mr. E. G. Stone, business agent of the Danites, is in the city to-day posting the town and making arrangements for the performance of Mr. and Mrs. McKee Rankin in this city on Wednesday, the 3d of December. For Freight Facilities.
The large platform railroad scales which were originally placed near the Union Depot, are to be removed to a more convenient locality near the warehouses on Nutt street. The employees of the roads are now engaged making the excavation, just east of where the tracks cross the street, necessary for the scales when they shall be removed, which will probably take place within a few days.

Another Fire.
Yesterday afternoon roundsman Scharff discovered a house on Hutaff's alley, in the First Ward, between Swann and Nixon streets, to be on fire. He with the assistance of a few colored women succeeded in extinguishing the flames before a general alarm was sounded. The house was occupied by colored people and is known as the "Sylvia property." The damage was light and is covered by insurance.

The Cape Fear.
The river is again very low and steamboatmen are proportionately unhappy. The steamer *D. Murchison* is here to-day on regular schedule, which she will try hard to maintain, in hopes of more water at an early day. The *North State* is also here and both steamers left to-day for Fayetteville. The recent rise amounted to only twelve or fourteen inches and nearly all of this has been lost. There is now only about twenty-six inches of water on the shoals.

Criminal Court.
The following cases were taken up and disposed of by this tribunal up to the time of this present writing to-day:
State vs. Oscar Batton, charged with mistaking a hog. Verdict not guilty.
State vs. S. B. Newsome, charged with false pretense. Case continued until February term of Court at the instance of the State, owing to some error in the transcript, sent here from South Carolina, where the defendant resides and was arrested.
The Court then took a recess at 3:30 p. m. for one hour.

To Relieve the Eyes.
The following, caught floating around in the papers, may be of service to bookworms and is probably worth experimenting with: Reading is rendered easy and fatigue to the eyes very much relieved by a simple service. Get a slip of mica, about three inches broad and six inches long, such as is used for filling in the little windows of stoves. Place this over the page and move it along, so as to cover the lines as you read. A large plate of the isinglass may be employed, so as to cover the whole page, if desired. The white surface of paper is pleasantly shaded and a book may be read in open sunlight or by bright lamp-light without fatigue. If the reader desires he may cover the mica slip with a light coat of green varnish. This is better than green goggles, and may be used with profit by the over-worked student and the consumer of endless novels.
