**Could Not Find a Law to Apply.**  
 The three sable colored youths, to wit  
 Henry Avant, Pot Hooks McFarland,  
 and David Mallett, who were arrested in  
 Lawyer Bellamy's office one night last  
 week, were this morning released after a  
 cautionary remark or two from the May-  
 or as to what would be done with them  
 if they were brought up before him again  
 shortly. But the fact of the matter was  
 there was no law on the statute book  
 which could reach them, inasmuch as they  
 were given the key to the office by one  
 John H Lewis, who was entrusted with  
 the key by Mr. Bellamy; consequently  
 the three were dismissed and John H  
 Lewis discharged from the employ of Mr  
 Bellamy.

**Death of Dr. King.**  
 It is our sorrowful duty to announce to  
 our friends to-day the death of Dr. James  
 Francis King, of this city, who died at  
 No. 1, Washington Square, in New York  
 City, at half past 8 o'clock last night.  
 The sad intelligence was received here  
 this morning by means of a telegram.  
 The remains probably left New York  
 this morning and if so will arrive here  
 to-morrow morning, in which case we  
 presume that the funeral services will  
 take place from St. James' Church to-  
 morrow afternoon. We state this, by  
 authority, in the absence of any knowl-  
 edge here yet as to definite arrangements.

Dr. King has for some time past been  
 suffering from a disease which is said by  
 some to have been liver complaint and by  
 others Bright's disease. He determined  
 last Summer, to retire for awhile from  
 the practice of medicine and to seek ab-  
 solute repose in the hopes of being soon  
 restored to health. On the 18th of last  
 August he left here for New York, his  
 family following a day or two later. From  
 New York they all went on to Saratoga  
 and in the Fall returned to New York,  
 where they have remained ever since. For  
 about two weeks past his case has been  
 considered as hopeless and on Wednesday  
 last his two married daughters in this city  
 arrived at his bedside. He was conscious  
 when they arrived and was able to converse  
 with him, and the entire family were with  
 him when he died.

Dr. King was about 60 years of age, as  
 nearly as we can ascertain, at the time of  
 his death. He was born in Carteret  
 county and was in the Confederate ser-  
 vice. Towards the close of the war he  
 removed to Wilmington where he has  
 remained ever since in the practice of his  
 profession. He was an excellent physi-  
 cian, combining with his knowledge of his  
 profession the soothing influences in a sick  
 room of an experienced nurse, and these,  
 coupled with his devotion to business,  
 soon earned for him a splendid practice.  
 He was a hard student and for many  
 years while here did not average more  
 than four hours of rest at night. It is no  
 wonder, then, that his health gave way  
 under such close application. Outside of  
 his profession he was a genial gentle-  
 man, courteous to all, and generous  
 alike of time and money to the poor and  
 afflicted. He was possessed of rare con-  
 versational powers and those who know  
 him well know how richly his mind was  
 stored. He had a host of warm personal  
 friends and his death here will leave a  
 void which cannot be easily filled.
