The Quarantine Board for this port  
and harbor met at Smithville to-day  
and is constituted as follows: Dr. W.  
G. Curtis, Port Physician, President,  
with Dr. J. C. Walker, Superintendent of  
Health for the County and City, and Dr.  
Thomas F. Wood, Secretary of the State  
Board of Health, as members. This is  
a regular meeting of the Board but sev-  
eral important matters connected with  
the quarantine regulations for this port  
will be discussed and considered, at this  
meeting. Doctors Wood and Walker  
left for Smithville on the *Passport* this  
morning and expect to return to the city  
by the same steamer this afternoon, but  
too late for us to furnish our readers in  
this issue with the result of the delibera-  
tions of the Board.
