dias A Tramp's Impressions.

A newspaper tramp has been to Darham, in this State, and sends his impressions to the New York World, which forthwith prints them. The report is full of inelegancies, inaccuracies and insinuations. He speaks of the inhabitants as though they were among the shoddlest of the sheddy and reviles their habits, their modes of life, their religion and their occupations, Among other things he pretends tol' tell of the madner in which the now far famed Dutham tobacco was first manufactured and was first made known to the world. He says that during the war a resident of the place, then but a railway station, was in the habit of crumbling tobacco in his hands for his own use in smoking. This became known to his neighbors whom he gradually became in the habit of su plying, and then, when the Federal troops got there, after Johnson's surrender, they got hold of some of this tobacco and when they were disbanded and had returned to their homes, they wrote to the party at Durham for small quantities and he supplied them. It is a well known fact to us, however, that smoking tobacco was manufactured in Durham and sold extensively as early as 1863, for we knew of one dealer in this city who ordered and received it by the barrel during that year, and it was evidently cut by machinery. It sold here, we remember, for \$5 per pound, Confederate money, of course. There are others here who will probably also recollect

The Mary Bear.

Mr. Sam. Bear, of Messrs. Sol Bear & Bros., owners of the schooner Mary Bear, received a letter to day from Capt. Chadwick relative to the wrecked schooner. We are sorry to hear that she will prove a total loss. Some small portions of the cargo have been saved, but in a damaged condition, as also a few of the sales and some portions of the rigging.

Geo. Richardson, a colored seaman belonging on board the schooner, arrived here this forenoon from the scene of the wreck. He left Capt. Chadwick and the others of the crew, the mate and three seamen, at work endeavoring to save some portion of the cargo. They expect to return to the city on Sunday or Monday. Richardson says that the gale first struck them early last Friday morning at 6 o'clock, the wind coming from the Northeast. They were then about 15 or 20 miles from the shore. The vessel sprung aleak and labored heavily; the wind gradually shifted around to the Southeast, and the ill-fated vessel was gradually driven ashore. She struck about 2 o'clock on a sand reef, about two hundred yards from the beach. The Captain and crew, as our readers know, saved themselves by swimming ashore, all with the exception of the unfortunate lad, Frank Fuller, who was drowned in the attempt. Search was afterwards made for his body for a distance of eight miles up and down the beach, but without success.

The vessel now lies in about 10 or 12 feet of water at the bow and about 6 feet at the stern, from which it would appear that she must have gone pretty well over the sand bar when driven up by the force of the wind. She had about three feet of water in the hold when she struck. She has not yet broken up but her decks are
