Crowded Cars. The train on the Wilmington & Weldon R.R. which came in this morning was crowded with those who came in to see the circus show. Accommodations were lacking but as they were bound to come many climbed to the top of the cars and rode in that fashion. The Mary Bear. Capt. Chadwick, of the wrecked schooner Mary Bear, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon. His account confirms, in the main, what has already been published by us relative to the loss of the vessel. But very little of the cargo was saved but all of the sails were secured, the smaller sails in good condition but the foresail and mainsail torn. Nothing has been seen of the body of the drowned boy, Frank Fuller, although Capt. Chadwick says that search was made for ten miles up and down the beach. The poor fellow was carried away by a wave just as he was preparing to lower himself in the water and swim ashore with the rest. His body must have been carried out to sea.

Robinson's Circus. John Robinson's Circus arrived in this city on yesterday morning, on their own train of cars. Everything is fixed up very nicely in the coaches and their special tubular flat-cars are something entirely new in this section of the country. The managerie is really very fine and everything advertised, as it is said, to be seen with the exception of the Polar bear, which died about two weeks ago.

The parade this forenoon was a creditable one and would have been more so but for the battered condition of things in general, the dresses looked rusty and the tinsel and glitter of the helmets and the contours of the masks were considerably damaged. The performance this forenoon was largely attended and we believe that it gave general satisfaction, as some one remarked in our hearing:—"there is no discount on Old John Robinson." The riding was very good and the acrobatic performances—without which, by the way, no circus can succeed—were especially fine, as were also the horizontal bar performance and the double-trapeze act. The trained dogs were there but we have had so much of that sort of thing here lately that it has about ceased to be an attraction. There will undoubtedly be another large audience to-night, the last of the show.

"My Journey with a King," by Louise Coffin Jones, is a delightfully vivid and amusing account of a voyage among the Sandwich Islands with King Kalakaua and his suite, and is timely in connection with the more extended tour which that potentate is now making in Europe. "A Day in the North Woods," by Ward Batchelor, and "Young America in Old England," by J. Magruder, are lively and well constructed sketches. There are several short stories in the number—"Mr. Harkin's Niece," by Sydney Chase, "Dora's Trial," by the late Ella Williams Thompson, and "Chaperons, and an Afternoon Tea," by Edward Wanton, besides a long instalment of Sherwood Bonner's new serial, "The Valcourts," which is as sprightly and vigorous in style as it is strong in character and incident. The poems and editorial departments are up to the usual high standard of the Magazine.
