Myers, et al, are defendants, the undersigned Commissioner, appointed for that purpose, will sell by public auction, to the highest bidder, for cash, at the Court House door, in the city of Wilmington, at 12 o'clock A. M., on Monday, May 1st, 1882, the following described pieces of land:

First—All that lot of land and premises situated in the city of Wilmington, on the east side of Front street, between Market and Dock streets, and bounded as follows: Beginning in the eastern line of Front street at the southern line of an alley, which runs from Front street to Second street, and separates this lot from the London lot on the north of said alley, and running thence with said Front street southwardly about forty-three feet to the line of a lot belonging to Levi A. Hart and Stephen P. Polley, thence with Hart and Polley's line eastwardly ninety-eight feet to Hart and Polley's other line, thence with said other line, northwardly thirty-four feet to the southern line of said alley, thence with said alley westwardly ninety-eight feet more or less to the beginning.
