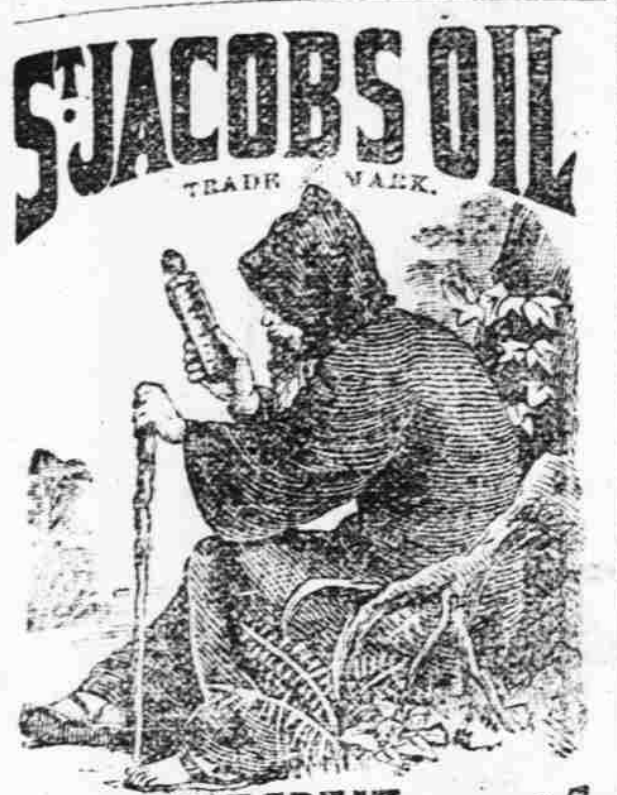

## Personal.

## The C. F. & Y. V. R. R.

We have never had an abounding faith in the promises made by Dr. Canedo, relative to the purchase of this road, and have expressed our doubts as to his ability to carry out to the letter the terms which he, himself, made in regard to its completion and the proposed prolongation of the line so as to connect with this city at its Eastern terminus and at Cincinnati as its terminus in the West. His propositions were very fair and could they have been carried out would have resulted in incalculable advantage to the country, along the entire proposed route, and would have necessarily made Wilmington one of the most business-like and thriving ports on the South Atlantic Coast.

Dr. Canedo has notified Gov. Jarvis of his inability to comply with the terms of the contract at the time specified, but gives the assurance that he will be able to do so in a short time, and asks for delay to enable him to comply with the terms of agreement.

The matter will probably come up at the meeting of the stockholders of the Company, which takes place to-day, and they will undoubtedly determine as to what action shall be taken in the premises.

It seems to us that, since Dr. Canedo and the company he represents have failed to "come to time," and since there is no definite assurance, save his bare say-so, that they will ever be able to fulfill their part of the contract, it would be eminently wise, just and proper to let the company represented by Gen. J. D. Imboden take the road on the same terms as those granted to Dr. Canedo. We learn that the people along the entire route are eager to have the company represented by Gen. Imboden take hold of the enterprise, and we also learn that his company is both willing and able to carry out every part of the contract to the letter.

## Enlarged.

The Lumberton Robesonian comes to us this week enlarged to a 32 column paper, it having heretofore contained but 28 columns. Its publisher, Mr. W. W. McDiarmid, has been for some years wishing to enlarge the size of the paper, but from one cause or another has not put his desire into execution until now. The Robesonian will continue to be published at \$2 per year, as heretofore, which, on account of the increased amount of reading matter, will be an important gain to its many readers, as well as an inducement for others to subscribe.
