IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE. WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Mr. Mahone, from the committee on Public Buildings and Grounds, reported favorably and had placed on the calendar bills authorizing the erection of public buildings at Greenville, S. C., and at Key West, Fla.

A message was received from the House of Representatives announcing the passage by that body of the bill for the relief of Fitz John Porter. The Senate took up the unfinished business on its calendar, being bills providing a method for perfecting incomplete titles to lands held under Mexican land grants, on which subject a debate arose.

Bills were reported as follows: By Mr. Hoar, favorably, from the committee on the Judiciary, the original bill to establish a uniform system of bankruptcy throughout the United States.

By Mr. Blair, favorably, from the committee on Education and Labor, a bill to establish a bureau of statistics of labor.

By Mr. Morgan, to provide for the erection of a public building at Huntsville, Ala.

By Mr. Wilson, to prevent the publication of lottery advertisements in localities in the District of Columbia.

Without reaching a vote on the Mexican land grant bill, the Senate went into executive session and soon afterwards adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Hoke, of Tenn., offered a resolution directing the committee on Education to inquire into the working and management of agricultural colleges, in aid of which lands have been granted to several States and territories, and to recommend such measures as will secure to the industrial classes the benefits intended by the act of Congress granting those lands. Referred.

Under the call of States a large number of bills, resolutions, &c., were introduced and referred. Among them were the following:

By Mr. Morrison, of Illinois, to reduce import duties and war tariff taxes.

By Mr. Eaton, of Conn., for punishment of officers of the United States for the illegal use of money or other things of value in elections.

By Mr. Robinson, of New York, amending the Constitution by providing that an export tax such as Congress may deem just and proper, for the encouragement of the home manufacture of our domestic products, may be laid on raw or manufactured cotton.

By Mr. Russell, of Mass., confirming the naval appointment of Lieut. J. U. Rhodes now in the revenue service, attached to the cutter Dexter, who rendered great service at the wreck of the City of Columbus.

By Mr. Long, of Mass., for the establishment of a life-saving station at Gay Head.

By Mr. O'Neill, of Mo., for the condemnation of land and material in the work of the improvement of the Mississippi river. Also, to define the duties and jurisdiction of the Mississippi river commission to authorize the condemnation of land and material and to provide penalties for acts in hindrance of the improvement of that river.

By Mr. Weller, of Iowa, for the relief of the Lady Franklin Bay expedition. It authorizes the President to pay a reward of one hundred thousand dollars to any vessel that may within the year 1884 rescue Lt. Greely and his party. The reward to be paid in standard silver dollars.

For erection of public buildings at Tallahassee, Florida and Brunswick, Ga.

STATE NEWS.

Raleigh Visitor: The spring term of the Supreme Court of North Carolina began to-day with their Honors Chief Justice Smith, and Associate Justice Merrimon, presiding—Judge Ashe being detained on account of a broken leg. There are fifteen applications for licenses—thirteen white and two colored.

Asheville Citizen: Mr. J. R. Common of Suscola, H. yowd sold at his barn 2,178 pounds of tobacco, unclassified, at 35 dollars per hundred, round.

Gen'l Johnstone Jones, Adjutant-General of North Carolina, leaves for Washington City on Monday to take steps to recover \$11,000 due this State as appropriation to the State Military, covered back into the Treasury of the United States in Gov. Brogden's administration because not claimed by our State authorities.

Charlotte Observer: The series of meetings in progress at the Second Presbyterian church for ten days past still continue and the interest increases. Last night the house was nearly filled.

Mrs Martha Barrier, a widow lady of Davidson College, killed a 4 months old pig that weighed 132 pounds and an 8 months old pig that weighed 250 pounds. Can the men farmers beat this? —The Carolina Central Railroad Company has just completed a large and substantial depot building at Iron Station, on the Shelby Division. Arrangements are being made to put a telegraph office in the depot and this will be done before the end of the present week, and an operator installed in the office.

Goldsboro Messenger: Mrs Letitia Morehead Walker has given \$1,000 to build a bath house at the Oxford Orphan Asylum, as a memorial to her son, John Morehead Walker. —The will of the late and greatly lamented A. K. Smedes, Esq. was admitted to probate before A. T. Grady, C. S. C. last Saturday. It is a very brief instrument, in which he gives his entire property, without specification, to his cousin, Miss Mary C. Smedes, of Louisiana. The will bears date September, 1883, and designates his brother, Mr George M. Smedes, executor. —We were shown by Mr. John Ward, of the firm of John Ward & Son, of New York, who was in the city on Thursday last, a silver half dollar of the "Confederate States of America," which was coined

in 1861. It is the only one we have ever seen; in fact there were very few sent out from the mint, and so rare are they that Mr Ward says he has refused \$500 in New York for the one he possesses. The coin is the exact size of the regular half dollar, and a fac simile of the same on the Goddess of Liberty side, with the date 1861 beneath. On the reverse side is the escutcheon of the Confederacy, a shield bearing the "Stars and Bars," so dear to the Southern heart, surrounded by a wreath composed of cotton branches and rice, and enclosed within the legend "Confederate States of America."

Statesville Landmark: Capt G A Eagle, who recently left this vicinity for Texas, has sent to his old friend, Mr T C Anderson, a pair of jack rabbit ears which measure thirteen inches from tip to tip. Capt Eagle killed the rabbit, the ears came of, and the ears are where all the curiosities come to—this office. —We don't know of anybody who has done better in the matter of hog raising than Mr T M Stikeleather, of Turnersburg township. He killed five, seventeen months old, which weighed a total of 1,760 lbs, or an average of 352. They were a cross of Essex and Berkshire.

News and Observer: The total amount of revenue collections in this the fourth district for January were \$26,313.16. —The clerk of the Supreme Court states that twelve applicants for licensed attorneys have thus far filed their names. It is probable that the number will by Monday be increased to two dozen. The number generally is from twenty four to thirty.

The receipts of cotton here for the week ending last Thursday were 311 bales, against 800 for the corresponding week last year. The total receipts from Sept. 1 to Thursday were 29,117 bales, against 37,847 to the same date last year. —The item, first published in this paper, about the work near Hamlet of a corps of engineers on the projected line of the Virginia and North Carolina railroad, has attracted marked attention. Night before last another corps of engineers passed this city on their way to Hamlet, to establish the line of the Virginia & North Carolina from that point further South. It is now a settled fact that the road is to be built.
