WASHINGTON, Feb 5.—The Fitz John Porter Relief bill, received yesterday from the House of Representatives, was today referred to the Senate Committee on Military Affairs. Mr. Allison introduced a bill providing for a branch soldier's home in one of the States of Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri or Nebraska. It was referred to the committee on Military Affairs. Mr. Sherman called up the bill recently introduced by him to suspend for five years the operation of the section of the Revised Statutes relating to guano islands. Debate followed, participated in by Messrs Sherman and Ransom favoring the bill and by Messrs Saulsbury, McPherson and Conger against it. The opponents of the bill grounded their opposition upon the ground of affording farmers of the United States the advantage of cheap guano, those in favor of it contending that these guanos by themselves were not adapted for our lands. Mr. Hawley offered a resolution which was agreed to, directing the Committee on Printing to inquire into the expediency of publishing an official gazette of the United States, to contain advertisements for proposals for contracts and general orders and announcements by the heads of executive departments, the more important appointments and such other matter as is now published by different branches of the government as advertisements, and directing that in the report of the said committee the expenses of the present methods of publishing such information be given in detail. Without disposing of the Mexican land title bill, the Senate went into executive session and adjourned. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Tucker, of Va., from the Judiciary committee, reported a bill to extend the duration of the Court of Commissioners of Alabama. Claims, referred to committee of the Whole. Mr. Broadhead, of Mo., from the same committee, reported adversely a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment for the election of postmasters, revenue collectors and U. S. district attorneys. Laid on the table. Mr. Hardeman, of Ga., from the committee on Territories, reported adverse to a bill for the election of Territorial Governors and Secretaries by the people of the territories. Laid on the table. A bill for the erection of a public building at Macon, Ga., to cost \$175,000, was reported from the Public Buildings committee, and referred to the committee of the Whole. The House went into committee of the Whole on the bill establishing a Bureau of Animal Industry. The bill was discussed by Messrs. Belford, Hatch of Maine, and Wilson of Iowa. The committee rose without concluding the discussion, and the House adjourned.

STATE NEWS.

Greenville Reflector: On Thursday, the 17th inst., the dwelling house of Mr. G. M. Tucker, who resides about four miles from Greenville, was destroyed by a fire, which accidentally caught from a stove. Mr. Tucker had finished building the house only a few days before it was burned and had not moved quite all of his furniture into it. Nearly all of the furniture was saved. Nothing was insured. Rebeonian: Mr. Archie McCall, of Ashpole, had his arm broken some days ago; he was driving a cotton stalk breaker, which getting entangled in a stump, threw him over, with the above result. A dwelling house at Harper's Ferry, occupied by Mose Cobb, and owned by Mr. Frank Henderson of Shreveport, was burned last week, in the day time. Supposed incendiary. We did not learn the amount of the loss. Insurance, \$350. Newbern Journal: The proper deed and bill of sale from the Neu-e River Navigation Company, and the Trent River Transportation Company, transferring their real estate six steamboats, warehouses, office furniture and all other property, over to the Neuse and Trent River Steamboat Company, were yesterday probated before Judge Carpenter, and the property represented therein was formally turned over to the new consolidated Company. The aggregate of this transaction amounts to \$46,000 and is no small item of a trade for this section. Charlotte Observer: Next week will be a rouser in theatrical circles. Boston Concert Company 11th; Minnie Hawk 12th, and Frederick Paulding 13th and 14th. The large mill house on the Rimer gold mine property, near Salisbury, was burned to the ground last Saturday night. It was the largest mill house in North Carolina, and contained a very large amount of machinery, including a fine and costly engine, all of which was destroyed by the fire. The property being lying idle for some time, the owners being non-residents of the State. The loss will reach \$30,000; amount of insurance unknown. It was the work of an incendiary. News and Observer: Yesterday His Excellency Governor Jarvis nominated to the President of the United States Hon. George Howard, of Tarboro, as commissioner to represent the State of North Carolina at the World's Centennial and Cotton Exposition, to be held at New Orleans, beginning December 1st. He also nominated Col. J. T. Morehead, of Greensboro, as alternate. At last tidings have come from K. J. Jenks, the man who two weeks ago eloped with the little Pearson girl from Apex. Jenks writes to a friend in Chatham county, saying that he and the girl are far South, "1,000 miles from Chatham," happy and contented. The letter is full of blackguardism.
