The Daily Review has the largest circulation of any newspaper published in the city of Wilmington. Scarlet fever of a malignant type is raging in the counties of the Shenandoah valley, Virginia.

The French Government has received advice to the effect that M. de Brazza is making excellent progress in his African schemes. Meisouier has painted 420 pictures. His new painting is three meters in length, and shows the knighting of Francis I by Bayard.

List's new oratorio, "Stanislaus," is nearly completed. It will be produced at the coming festival of the German Musical Union at Weimar. A district telegraph of New York city and a telegraph line from St. Louis to New Orleans and Texas are reported as the latest acquisitions of the B. & O. Telegraph.

The Pope has despatched a corner stone and a marble altar slab for the cathedral to be erected at Cathairveen, county Kerry, Ireland, in memory of Daniel O'Connell. It is estimated that about 35 per cent. of Englishmen are worth \$500 and upwards.

Forty-three English yachts are cruising in the Mediterranean this winter. The Marylebone Cricket Club have consented to allow Messrs Flowers and Peate to go to America and coach the Philadelphia team prior to its visit to England.

The Egyptian question, which is now exciting so much attention in Europe and this country, will be discussed by Gen. W. W. Loring, Pasha, in a paper entitled "What will become of Egypt," in the Manhattan for March. Gen. Loring's service of ten years under the Khedive Ismail, during which he conducted the campaign against the Abyssinians, makes the General one of the greatest living authorities on all matters relating to Egypt.

New York World: "We regret to observe that Senator John Sherman is not disturbed in the least by the terrible news that the life of a human being in the State of Ohio is worth no more than the life of a yellow dog. A mob near his own home drags a man out and hangs him without law or jury, and Mr Sherman says nothing." If a negro should be maltreated by a mob of white men on election day in South Carolina, Mr. Sherman would arise and "whereas" with great vehemence. Why is a white Ohio man not engaged in politics of less consequence than a voting Southern negro for the purposes of Republican statesmanship?

One of the most horrible and unnatural crimes known to this or any other age was perpetrated not long ago in East Prussia. A telegraphic report from Berlin, dated February 9th, says: A murder trial which has aroused much interest in East Prussia has just ended at Interburg in the conviction and sentence to death of the widow Eske, for the murder of nine persons of her family. The crime, as shown by the evidence, was a most atrocious one.

Queen Victoria's new book, "Life in the Highlands," will be issued this week. It is dedicated as follows: "To my loyal Highlanders, and especially to the memory of my devoted personal attendant and faithful friend John Brown, these records of my widowed life in Scotland are gratefully dedicated. VICTORIA R."

A cablegram to the New York Herald thus speaks of this royal edition: In her opening chapters the Queen devotes a number of pages to John Brown. She tells how Brown became the favorite of Prince Albert, and gives fully the secrets of her own reasons for trusting him. Then she minutely describes the functions that Brown fulfilled in the royal household. Oh! his praises are loudly and feelingly sung! Other domestics of the court are mentioned in kindly terms. In all personal references the Queen invariably uses the plural number. "Our beloved daughter Beatrice," "Our devoted attendant John Brown," "Our beloved uncle, the Emperor of Germany," and "Our deeply lamented daughter Alice" receive frequent allusions. There is scant reference to the Prince of Wales.
