IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb 18.—A bill was adopted authorizing the erection of a public building at Mason, Ga.

Mr. Harrison introduced a bill for the admission of the State of Dakota into the Union on equal footing with the original States. Referred to the committee on Territories.

After the passage of a number of private and unimportant bills, the Senate, at 2 o'clock, resumed consideration of the Currency bill, and Mr. Pugh addressed the Senate in favor of the Plumb amendment.

Mr. Cike followed Mr. Pugh and favored the passage of the Plumb or Vest amendment, providing for the issue of Treasury notes as bank circulation is retired.

Mr. Vest then addressed the Senate in advocacy of his amendment.

Mr. Jones, of Fla., opposed the proposition of Mr. Vest, and defended the banks.

Mr. Call thought that all of the proposed measures were defective, and would not, as they stood, accomplish the purpose for which they were intended.

The debate was continued by Messrs. Plumb, Morrill and others, until the Senate, after a brief executive session, adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Under the call of States, the following bills, &c., were introduced and referred:

By Mr. Pell, of Ark., granting 320 acres of public lands to each of the survivors of the Mountain Meadow massacre.

By Mr. Belford, Cal., a resolution calling on the Secretary of State to inform the House whether Prince Bismarck has sent to his department any letter touching the resolution recently passed by this House concerning the death of Lasker, and if so, to transmit a copy of the same, and inform the House of any advice he may have on this subject, either by telegraph or letter.

By Mr. King, of La., appropriating \$500,000 for the relief of the sufferers from floods in the lower Mississippi valley. Also, for the distribution of seeds to the sufferers from the flood.

Mr. Dowd, of N. C., from the committee on Coinage, Weights and Measures, moved to suspend the rules, and adopt the resolution making the bill for the retirement of the trade dollar the special order for Tuesday, the 11th of March. Agreed to.

A bill was passed fixing at one cent each four ounces, the rate of postage on second class mail matter, when sent by persons other than publishers or newspaper agents.

The Pensions Committee was called, and Mr. Hewitt, of Ala., moved to suspend the rules and adopt a resolution making the Mexican pension bill the special order for the 21st inst. On this motion many Republicans refrained from voting, thus leaving the House without a quorum. A call of the House was ordered, and the Sergeant-at-Arms was ordered to take absentees into custody and bring them before the bar of the House.

The House at 10 p. m. was still filibustering, no business being transacted.

GORDON'S STRATEGY.

Report that He Has Recognized The False Prophet.

LONDON, Feb. 18.—A dispatch from Cairo says:—"General Gordon has arrived at Khartoum. He has had a proclamation posted at Khartoum recognizing El Mahdi as Sultan of Kordofan, remitting half the taxes and placing no restriction on the slave trade. The Arabs of Khartoum express great satisfaction."

EGYPTIAN JEALOUSIES.

Egyptian soldiers presented to the Khedive an address protesting against the despatch of Egyptians to the Sudan and demanding the removal of the British military officers, who, they said, were aliens by race and religion. General Sir Evelyn Wood was immediately summoned to the place, and on his arrival confronted the mutineers, who were then and there arrested. The incident is considered to be of very grave import, especially following the departure of the British from Cairo for Suakim.

A number of Egyptian soldiers had been selected to drive a camel battery to the Sudan. The petition, which was presented by four privates, was numerously signed and purported to be endorsed by the whole Egyptian army, which objected to being employed in a Christian expedition. General Sir Evelyn Wood declares that the signatures to the petition are forgeries. It is the general opinion that the Egyptian army ought to be disbanded, as it is useless and dangerous. A despatch from Cairo says:—"The mutiny itself is considered of trifling importance and has not shaken the confidence of the English officers in the Egyptian troops." Orders have been given to confine the British expedition to the relief of Tokar. It is expected that a decisive battle will be fought on the 24th inst. The rebels fired on the forts to day, but soon retired.

AT TOKAR.

The scouts sent from Trinkitat toward Tokar report that Osman Digna, the rebel leader, is massing men near a defile closing the road from the coast, at the spot where he defeated Tahir Pacha and Colonel Moeerick. It is supposed that Osman Digna's plan is, if he fails to reduce Tokar before the arrival of the English troops, to give battle at the defile. Shiek Morghani and Colonel Messadaha, who were sent from Suakim to stir up the tribes in the vicinity, report that they only succeed in securing a promise of neutrality from the chiefs. Admiral Hewitt is advancing his lines four miles outside of the Suakim zone. His trenches are within range of the guns of the English fleet and the forts.

Tokar is hotly pressed by the rebels, who have turned against the town a number of Krupp guns recently captured from the Egyptians. The Has-

sars have started from Cairo for Suakim

Some of the shots fired by the rebels at Suakim to day reached the military headquarters, and Baker Pacha had a narrow escape.

The Porte will send 10,000 men to Jiddah, in Arabia, to be kept in readiness for service in the Soudan in case they are needed.

Humbert in Danger.

ROME, Feb. 17.—The Government has received information from Civita Vecchia that when a train by which King Humbert was returning from a hunting trip was between Montalto and Corneto, four men on the roadside fired at the carabineer guarding the train. The latter fired six shots at the assailants and wounded one of them. He also seized and rendered harmless a bottle of gunpowder with a lighted fuse attached, which the miscreant had thrown aboard the train. The men escaped.

The Lasker Resolution

BERLIN, Feb. 17.—The American Legation here has no information regarding the reported return by Prince Bismarck of the resolution of condolence over the death of Herr Lasker adopted by the United States House of Representatives.

The *Tagblatt* hopes that Americans will not hold the Germans responsible for the acts of Prince Bismarck.

STATE NEWS.

Greensboro Workman: The revival at Eden still goes on with increasing interest. Congregations large and attentive; 15 have professed religion and many others are inquiring the way. Twenty have joined the church.

Goldsboro Messenger: Again we have the pleasure of announcing to the citizens of Goldsboro that the Rev. Dr. W. H. Milburn, "the blind man eloquent," whose lectures here last fall were so largely attended and highly enjoyed, will deliver two of his best lectures in this city on Thursday and Friday nights of next week. One will be "Stonewall Jackson," and the other will be either on "Robt. E. Lee," or "Our Best Society."—It is not yet decided which.—At the residence of Mr. E. F. Hatcher, the Rev. Dr. Whitfield officiating, on Saturday at 3 o'clock p. m., Mrs. L. M. Waters, who has been boarding in this city during the winter, was united in the holy bond of matrimony to Mr. H. N. Willey, both of Chicago, Ill. Mr. Willey arrived here on the eve of the marriage. The happy couple will return to Chicago after making a wedding tour through the Southern States.

The Raleigh *Visitor* has the following particulars of a murder in Harnett county: Daniel Lucas, aged about 53 years, killed William Williams, aged 83 years—both white—and heretofore regarded as two of as peaceable citizens as the county contained. It appears that Lucas went to Williams' house and assisted him to grind his axe. Then Williams told him or reproached him about a bribe bit that Lucas' son had borrowed. Lucas told him that he knew nothing of it, but to send up to his house and he would send him two bits. Williams replied that he was upholding his son's rascality, and it is said that Williams struck Lucas first, Lucas went outside the yard and was followed by Williams. Lucas, it is said, struck Williams with a hoe or some other heavy instrument and cracked his skull, from the effects of which he died in about three days. Lucas has engaged Messrs D H McLean, O J Spears and W E Murchison to defend him. The case promises to be quite interesting.
