THEIR FINAL REST.

The Arctic Heroes Home at Last.

NEW YORK, February 23.—Notwithstanding the cold, cutting rain which fell in blinding sheets this morning, the pier at the foot of East 23rd street was crowded by a well dressed, orderly throng, who stood patiently in the storm against which they were adequately provided with umbrellas and waterproofs, awaiting the arrival of the tug Catalpa, having on board the remains of the arctic heroes. At 10 o'clock the tug swung into the pier and landed the marine guard and band, and those who were to take part in the procession formed on both sides of the street. The arrangements completed, the work of disembarking the caskets, which held all that remained of the heroes who perished amid the ice of the Arctic seas, began. They were brought forth and placed in hearses in the following order: Lieut. Commander De Long, Seaman Cook, Goertz, Dreiser and Ah Sam, Machinist Lee and Coal Heaver Iverson. The procession was formed, headed by a carriage containing the Right Rev. H. C. Potter, D. D., who was to officiate at the services. The hearses followed, and then came the survivors of the Jeannette expedition and the officers of the Jeannette relief expedition and mourners. The line of march was through 23d street and Fifth avenue, thence East to 42d street and thence to the church of the Holy Trinity at 42d street and Madison avenue, where a dense crowd was struggling for admittance. After much difficulty the funeral procession passed into the church in the following order: Bishop Potter, the Rev. W. T. Watkins, the pastor of the church and an associate, chanting "I know that my Redeemer liveth." The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh away." The surviving officers of the Jeannette came next and led by Commodore Upsilon, a knot of naval officers in glittering uniforms, and then came the seven sealed caskets, each of which was borne by eight marines. In the space fronting the altar rested seven heavily draped catafalques. On these the caskets were laid. In the center rested the one holding the remains of the young commander. On it were laid his sword and uniform, betokening his rank, and a large American flag draped gracefully was laid in peaceful folds over the whole. The other caskets were covered only by blue flags, dotted with white stars. A few minutes later the floral tributes were brought in rich and dazzling profusion. By this time the church was filled. Mrs. De Long, her little son and her father and mother, who had come over from Brooklyn with the remains, occupied seats facing the altar. Just back sat her brothers and their wives and the Misses Bradford, daughters of the arctic artist. All were dressed in the deepest mourning, and sat throughout the services with their heads bowed upon their clasped hands. To the left of the sad group sat Messrs Melville, Niderman and Noros, in full uniform, their grief betokened by the crepe which fluttered on their left arms. The choir sang the hymn "Domini Refugium," after which pastor Watkins read the 15th chapter of Corinthians. His voice had hardly died away before the choir burst into the hymn, "My God, my father, while I stray from my home on life's rough way; oh, teach me from my heart to say Thy will be done." Bishop Potter then delivered an address, closing with a prayer, after which the choir sang the anthem "I heard a voice from heaven." Then the vast audience slowly filed out and the funeral services over the brave dead were ended. The remains were then conveyed to Woodlawn cemetery where they were interred.

NEW YORK, February 23.—Over 25,000 people were present at the Roman Catholic cathedral, on Fifth avenue, to-day, to pay their last tribute of respect to the memory of the late Jerome J. Collins, meteorologist of the Jeannette expedition. The casket containing the remains was escorted by the 69th regiment from their armory, where it had been guarded during the night, to the cathedral. It was covered with American and Irish flags. The casket was placed just without the canopy and just behind it rested another casket containing the remains of the mother of Collins, who died six months after his departure for the Arctic regions. After the ceremonies, which were impressive, a procession was formed and the two caskets were conveyed to the Inman pier and placed on board of the City of Chicago. The remains will be interred in Cork.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The remains of Dr. James M. Ambler, past assistant surgeon U. S. N., one of the victims of the Jeannette expedition, are expected to arrive in this city tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock. They will

leave New York at 9 o'clock this evening, accompanied by the brother of the deceased and ten medical officers of the navy. There will be no formal ceremony here. The remains will be met by a delegation of medical officers, who will accompany them to their final resting place at the home of Dr. Ambler's mother, in Fauquier county, Va., about thirty miles from this city. The journey from this city will be made in a special train tendered by the Virginia Midland road.
