A few years ago a colony of Mormons from the Alleghany Mount ins of the South was establish ed in San Louis Park, Col., in the hope that they would be able to introduce Mormon members in the Colorado Legislature and control United States senatorships by holding the balance of a great exposition at San Francisco of power. The bishops dictated the political actions of the colony until a Virginian, William L. Ball, declared that although he had been a Mormon for fifteen years he should henceforth "stand upou his manhood and his rights as a citizen" and cast his vote as he pleased. About forty of the colony supported Ball in his attitude, and were excommunicated by the Church, increased the disaffection till three hundred dec ared their indedependence.
