To the Editor of the Review:
 DEAR SIR:—My attention was drawn last night to an article in your valuable paper taken from the *Staats Zeitung*. To be frank, I have often been annoyed, and no doubt a good many Germans besides me, by articles and remarks in certain daily papers, whose editors seem to take a delight in abusing Germany, her government and laws.

I have taken all this in silence because I had my great doubts that the said editors could quote a single German law, and took the liberty to think that their knowledge of the German government and Germany was equal to their knowledge of German laws. I did not break my silence either, when I have seen annoying articles in certain German-American newspapers, because I have a perfect contempt for a man who makes it apparently a study of his life to abuse his native country, which contempt is only equalled for a man who delights in abusing his father and mother.

In breaking my silence now and venturing to do it in a language foreign to me, I do it simply to inquire, as you have not been in the habit of joining the crowd of German abusers, why you copied the said article? Was it to prove an insult to the American Nation? Pray inform me where was the insult?

Suppose, when Mr. Jeff. Davis dies a foreign congress would pass a resolution condoling the American Nation on the loss of the great orator, the great statesman, and would express at the same time the wish that his idea of State rights and an independent Confederate government would soon be realized; or suppose, at the death of Wendell Phillips, a foreign government had passed a resolution that the loss by death of the great abolitionist was a heavy blow to civilization and had expressed the hope that his ideas of a higher law would soon find many friends and that the constitution of the United States would be torn to pieces; or suppose at the death of Brigham Young, an Asiatic or African government had condoled the many widows and expressed the hope that soon all Americans would follow his example; or suppose at the death by hanging of John Brown (who I believe was considered by some men in the North a martyr) a congress of a foreign state had sent a letter of condolence to the Brown family in which sympathy and the hope that his so-called noble efforts to free the negroes would bear fruit & had been expressed; and suppose either one of the above supposed resolutions or letters of condolence had been sent to the foreign minister at Washington representing the foreign government, and had requested the said minister to forward a copy of the resolution to the bereaved family and another copy to the American congress, what would America have done?

Would the reply of the American government have been more polite than the letter of Prince Bismarck?
 The Kanzler, as I understand, couches his remarks in the most polite language possible, and thanks the American Congress for the sympathy expressed for the loss by death of a German citizen, and only very politely objects to the remarks about certain ideas about government, and very politely asks the privilege that Germany may be permitted to rule herself without foreign interference.

God has implanted in the breast of the German nation the love of Government free from foreign interference and the great American nation has proclaimed the same idea most emphatically to the world.

It is not possible in my opinion that the American nation can take offence because the written answer to a written communication from the American Congress or American Secretary of State, not an answer to a letter from Mr. Sargent, was sent through the German minister at Washington, and not handed to Mr. Sargent to be forwarded. Why, it strikes me Mr. Sargent would undoubtedly have taken offence if Prince Bismarck had asked him, to forward his Bismarck's letter, to forward his, Bismarck's, letter. Some, however, contend that Mr. Sargent has been insulted by Prince Bismarck. Where is the proof???

I believe it is admitted by Prince Bismarck's worst enemies and opponents that he never intentionally insults, and does not allow his subordinates to insult, because I believe he claims that an insult irritates and never convinces a person to be in the wrong.
 It is at least certain that the former American Minister at Berlin has been treated with the greatest respect and

kindness. The said American Minister delivered a speech or lecture upon his return from Berlin. I think at Boston, full of praise of the German government, and full of praise of the German people. Why should Mr. Sargent have been treated differently? If he has I claim it must be his own fault.

Some years ago the Russian Minister at Washington had made I believe some remarks to which Mr. Grant, the President at the time, took offense. Mr. Grant, if I am rightly informed, refused to receive him after that, and the Russian Minister was recalled. I do not think Russia took offense, because I believe it has been the rule of all nations to recall a Minister if he forgets himself and uses or publishes offensive language.

Some persons contend that the published reports of Mr. Sargent did not take well at Berlin; but nobody has so far claimed that Mr. Sargent has been ill treated on account of it.
 Where, then, is the insult?
