The interview between the Emperor William, to which the Emperor Alexander also may be hidden, issued as contemplated by the fear of the secret, is a serious one in the dominions of each of these rulers. The monarchs are anxious to combine in common and united action against their veiled assailants; and, to effectively meet these assailants, united action on the part of the monarchs is clearly necessary. In many cases the plotters against thrones make a foreign country the basis of their operations. Each ruler must therefore stand on guard for his brother rulers. The idea of an international treaty, enlarging the scope of existing extradition laws, and demanding of the signatories a more watchful vigilance in detecting and punishing designs against a friendly sovereign, was broached some time ago. It is likely that this idea forms the motive, in part at least, of the Imperial Conference which is soon to be held. But such a combination would scarcely give assurance of immunity from secret plots unless England, France and Switzerland, to say nothing of the other European States, should in some form enter into it. The dynamic discoveries in the London railway stations may incite England to listen to such a proposal with a willing ear. But France would hardly assent to such a scheme, and Switzerland has always been extremely tenacious of her right to harbor political refugees, and to protect the liberty of those who seek safety within her frontiers.
