#### OUR FOREIGN TRADE.

The New York Commercial Bulletin presents additional facts in connection with the foreign trade of 1883, as gleaned from details since issued by the Burean of Statistics. The exhibit shows year were considerably in excess of 1882, notwithstanding a heavy decrease in December, in the shipment of raw cotton there was an increase of about 74 per cent. over 1882. The quantity of fresh beef shipped last year 117,790,342 pounds, against 54,426 880 pounds in 1882-an increase of more than 100 per cent. Bacon and hams increased 22 per cent, and cattle 133 per cent. Taking the exports of food products altogether, as representby values, there was increase amounting to \$17,000,000; cereals showing a loss of \$9 000,000. and meat and dairy products a gain of \$26,000,000. It is evident from this that the food wants of Europe are falling off, but that our exports of wheat are contingent more upon competition than before.

The imports of merchandise during the year were, in value, about sixty-six millions less than in the previous year; but the reduction was not confined to a few articles, as in the case of exports, being generally distributed over the trade more than of anything else Such articles as coffee, tea, sugar. fruits and wine all exhibit an important decrease in values, amounting altogether to some fourteen million dellars, though in the first three there was an important increase in quantities. In raw materials and partially manufactured articles, there was a more decided decrease still, as to values, but in many instances here also there was an increase in quantites. In iron and its manufactures there was a decrease in both quantities and values. 


