It is now suggested, says the News and Observer, that the nominations for for State officers shall not be made until after the Chicago convention. this proposition were to involve the ne cessity of two State conventins that would doubtless be an insuperable ob jection to the idea. Perhaps, however the State Executive Committee, when it meets, may feel at liberty to provide for the selection of delegates to the National convention otherwise than by their election by a State convention-if that course be admissab e.

In such case, there could be no ob. jection to postponing the call for the S;ate convention until after the candi date for the Presidency has been nominated. There is, however, we fear, a requirement in the plan of the National organization that the delegates shall be chosen by a convention.

If that be so, to postpone nominating State officers would necessitate two conventions-and two conventions so close to each other would be onerous. The candidates ought to be on the many counties will not be visited by them. The canvass should therefore begin not later than the middle of July. within ten days after the Chicago convention. If a convention be called to elect delegates to the national convention, we suppose it will meet about the first of July; and then in order to put to purify the blood, and impart energy our State candidates in the field by the middle of July, a second convention would have to assemble within a fort pight. Under such circumstances neither convention would be well attended. As far as we know there has been as yet no interchange of opinion among members of State committee upon this subject, although doubtless our excellent and efficient chairman, Capt. Coke, has given the matter some considera-

The national convention is more than three months off and plenty of time remains to work out these details. seems to us that it would be well to defer the preliminary proceedings as late as possible, keeping in view the desirability of giving the candidates full time to make an easy canvass of all the counties in the State.






