It is now suggested, says the News and Observer, that the nominations for State officers shall not be made until after the Chicago convention.

In such case, there could be no objection to postponing the call for the State convention until after the candidate for the Presidency has been nominated.

If that be so, to postpone nominating State officers would necessitate two conventions—and two conventions so close to each other would be onerous.

The candidates ought to be on the stump about four months for otherwise many counties will not be visited by them. The canvass should therefore begin not later than the middle of July, within ten days after the Chicago convention.

The national convention is more than three months off and plenty of time remains to work out these details. It seems to us that it would be well to defer the preliminary proceedings as late as possible, keeping in view the desirability of giving the candidates full time to make an easy canvass of all the counties in the State.

In the discussion of the matter of "aid to common schools," in the United States Senate, a few days since, Senator Hoar, of Massachusetts, took occasion to make a dig at North Carolina by designating her as "the tail State among the thirty-eight of the American Commonwealths in the matter of her school children."
