For the first quarter of the present year, ending March 31st, the business failures in the United States are reported by R. G. Dunn & Co., of the Mercantile Agency, to number 3,296, as against 2,806 for the corresponding quarter of last year. The liabilities for the quarter just concluded amount to \$40,000,000, as compared with \$37.-000,000 in the first quarter of 1883, an increase of only \$3,000,000. In the first quarter of 1882 the failures were 2,127, and in the same period of 1881 they numbered 1,761. The liabilities for the first quarter of 1882 are \$33,000.000. and for the first quarter of 1881 \$21,000,-000. 


