Dr. Zakertort, the champion chess-player, is picking up some money in his American tour. Before leaving New York he sent home \$2,900.

Sir Moses Montefiore's centennial birthday anniversary, on October 24, will be celebrated in New York, where meeting of preparation are being held already.

Mr. Parnell, the member of Parliament, has brought an action against Mrs. Dora West to recover nearly \$600 arrears of rent for lands at Mount Avon, Wicklow.

Dr. J. H. Zakertort, the champion chess player, in a blindfold contest on last week, at Pittsburg, won eight out of twelve games. The match lasted seven hours.

Mrs. Carlisle's social exactions are said to be more onerous than the duties of the Speaker himself. She has returned already 750 calls this season and has several hundred more to make.

The Central Pacific Railroad proposes to tunnel the Sierra from Truckee to Blue Canon, and do away with the snowsheds, which are getting old and rotten, and break down easily under a heavy weight of snow.

T. Thomas Fortune, editor of the New York Globe, the colored people's organ, is in Washington, collecting data from government departments to use in the completion of his new work entitled "The Social Problem in the South."

Electric lights have been introduced in a gunpowder manufactory in England. The buildings are scattered over three miles of territory, and the wires are carried above ground from a dynamo near the centre of the enclosure.

Mr. William Astor's steam yacht, the *Nourmahal*, is nearly ready for launching, and by August will be prepared for service. She is entirely of steel, 227 feet long, with 30 feet breadth of beam. She will eclipse anything afloat, at a cost of \$350,000.

Poland is to undergo a "Russification," in accordance with the orders that Governor General Gourko has received from the Czar. A Russian literary, supported by government aid, and a national Russian theatre at Warsaw are to be established as the preliminary step in the above direction.

There are 500,000 persons employed in coal mines in Great Britain, and of these in 1878 no fewer than 1,313 were killed, and within the last ten years, since the passing of the mines act, the yearly average has been 1,200, or one in every thirty-eight employed, as compared with one in every seventy-five of British sailors lost at sea.

Burne Jones is painting a picture of King Copethua and the beggar maid. The King is setting on the steps of his throne in very deep red and blue raiment at the feet of the beggar maid who sits on the throne in a scanty dark gray dress, looking shy and perplexed. The throne is hung with anemone colored draperies and above two boys are reading from a brilliantly colored scroll.

The annual return of the volunteer corps of Great Britain for 1884 shows that the total number enrolled in that year (309,365) was the highest in the history of the force. The number of recruits was 202,428, as against 199,374 in 1882, and 200,135 in 1881 (the largest number previously recorded), and the percentage of recruits to enrolled was 96.60, against 96.16 and 96.08 in the two previous years; and the percentage of men present at inspections to enrolled was also higher than ever before.

The Minstrels.
Messrs. Thatcher, Primrose & West's Minstrels arrived in the city last night and registered at the Parcell House. There were 32 persons composing the company. They made, as per announcement, a street parade at 11:30 this forenoon, and their appearance created quite a sensation, partly on account of their fine, modest, but attractive uniforms, but mainly on account of the really excellent music they discoursed. Several members of the company took advantage of the delightful weather and made a trip to the Sound this afternoon.
